THE PRINCESS.

By the Graduating Class Assisted by the Juniors.
At 8:30 p. m. Thursday, May 26, at the King Opera House, the Senior class of the Greenville High School, assisted by the Junior class, will present, "The Princess," a Medley in six cantos, by Alfred Lord Tennyson.

Synopsis of the Play.
Subject: Woman's Higher Education. Theme: "For woman is not an undeveloped man, but diverse."
Canto I.—The Departure. Scene: Court of Prince's Palace.

Amassadors return from the South Country with presents and letters from King Cania, father of the Princess Ida, announcing that the Princess refuses to wed the Prince according to pre-contract and that she has founded, near the southern borders of the prince's prospective kingdom, a university for women only. The prince begs to go for her; his request is refused; with his friends Florian and Cyril, he determines to find her, and, disguising themselves as women, they steal away to enter the Princess Academy as pupils.

Intercalary Poem—The Lullaby Quartette: Miss Fisher, Miss Mostel, Mr. Henyon, Mr. Jones.
Canto II.—The Wolves Within the Fold. Scene: At the gateway of the academy.

Part I.—Time: Early morning a week later. The Prince and two friends disguised seek enrollment as Lady Psyche's pupils.
Part 2.—Scene: In the Lecture Hall of the Academy. Time: One hour later.

The Prince and his friends are welcomed by the President, Princess Ida, and are formally enrolled; they hear Lady Psyche's harangues on Woman's Position; she recognizes them and extorts their promise to leave; while they are talking, Melissa overhears them, but promises to keep secret.

Part 3.—Scene: In the Lecture Hall. Time: Early morning a week later. The three adventurers, secure in their disguise, seek a brief relaxation from the trying ordeal of masquerading as women; they rehearse their experience and congratulate themselves upon the success of their scheme, only the Lady Blanche seems to be suspicious; Melissa comes to warn them that on the night before her mother, the Lady Blanche, had warned the secret of their identity from her and was even then on her way to expose them; Cyril goes to

intercede with Lady Blanche and finally persuades her to postpone the denouncement. The princess comes with a message from the Princess inviting them to go with her on a scientific expedition that afternoon.

Intercalary poem—The Echo Song, Mr. Henyon.
Canto III.—The Expedition. Scene: Woodland near Academy. Time: Afternoon of same day.

The Prince (unrecognized) speaks of his love; the Princess tells of her plans and purposes; the Princess calls for a song; Violet sings the First Plot Song; The Passion of Memory, the Prince "apes their trouble" in the Second Plot Song, the Lyric of Hope, "a mere love song"; the Princess demands a song of their country; Cyril sings a tavern song unsuited for ladies; the three friends are recognized as men; there are shrieks and a disorderly flight; the Prince and Florian are captured; Cyril escapes; Lady Psyche, who has left her baby at the Academy, sees without it.

Intercalary Poem—The Battle Call, Miss Anderson.
Canto IV.—The Trial and Expulsion. Scene: Hall of Justice at the Academy. Time: Night of same day.

Prince and Florian brought before the Princess for trial. Lady Blanche, the affluent orator, too ardent in her prosecution is dismissed by Princess Psyche's baby is kept by Princess; messengers arrive, telling of the near approach of the Prince's father with an army to besiege the academy; Princess quietly fears of the girls; Prince and Florian thrust out.

Intercalary Poem—The Consolation, Miss Anderson.
Canto V.—Triumph and Forgiveness. Part I.—Camp of Prince's father. Time: Near morning of same night.

Prince and Florian are admitted into camp. King Cania who has been captured and held as hostage is released; meeting of Prince, Florian and Cyril who conducts them to Psyche's tent where she is bemoaning the loss of her babe. Prince Arac arrives, Farley between Arac and Prince, who renounces to waive his claim on Princess; they agree to settle dispute by force of arms, three to three, if Princess will consent to abide by the issue.

Part 2.—Same Scene; early next morning. Holium of messengers with agreement of Princess to marry Prince if her side falls; the fight; Prince falls; Ida exalts over her fallen enemies and comes in to offer her services to those who have championed her cause; she finds the Prince apparently dead, but when she finds him alive, begs to nurse him; this request is refused when she seems so hard to Psyche, but after their reconciliation, her request is granted and the doors of the academy are thrown wide open to receive all the wounded.

Intercalary Poem—Reluctant Surrender, Miss Anderson.
Canto VI.—The Victory of Love. Scene: Room in the academy. Time: Seven nights later.

The Princess has nursed the Prince through the crisis of his fever and through interest and tenderness she learns to love. Then follows a noble wooing which finds its reward in her confident trust.

M. F. Turner, et al vs. Amanda Turner et al. Decree of partition with interest of respective parties as follows: Mrs. M. F. Harrell, Mrs. A. Cannon, Gideon O. Turner, minor, each 29 2/100 acres, and to Mrs. A. F. Turner 131 62/100 acres. The court found that the land was not susceptible of partition in kind, and appointed Chas. C.
