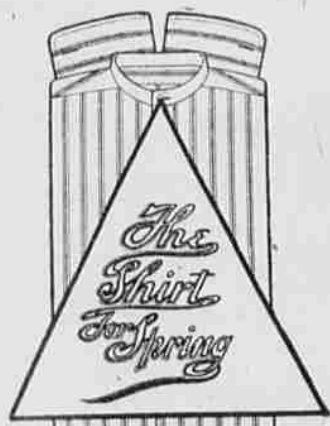

### COCHRAN ON THE RATE

INSURANCE MAN BEFORE FIRE RATING BOARD.

He Believes Rivalry Between Cities to Reduce Key Rate is Desirable.

Austin, Tex., June 24.—Almost the entire morning session of the state fire rating board in the hearing on the fire insurance rates was taken up by the argument of S. P. Cochran, an insurance man of Dallas. While admitting it was not his purpose to defend the fire rating law, he would defend the general business of the companies. He made an argument in which the workings of the law were outlined as productive of a desirable rivalry among the cities of the state to secure lower key rates.

He declared the interference of the state to dictate the insurance rates is an erroneous principle and will prove obnoxious to the people which will ultimately develop paternalism in its worst form.

"Insurance companies," said Mr. Cochran, "are conducted just as any ordinary business and should be allowed to regulate themselves always with such state supervision by the state as will prevent the defaulting of policy holders or other illegal practices."

He said the new schedules, though having flaws, on the whole, is a just method of measuring the rates and will make any citizen, unless moved by selfishness, unwilling to see the method or law under which it is adopted abolished.

The argument was made that since 1901 there has been a steady reduction in rates in Texas due to competition and inadequate schedules. As a result of which insurance companies have been "breaking even" instead of creating surplus to meet the constantly increasing liabilities through the increase of fires, and are thus actually losing ground, he said.

At the outset of Mr. Cochran's argument which was preceded by that of Attorney Thompson of Dallas, continued from yesterday, Editor Slater of the El Paso Herald interrupted to remark that while the use of single roofs, which had been referred to by Mr. Thompson caused a penalty of two cents on the city's key rate, besides the added penalty on each individual risk, no credits are given for a preponderance of masonry in buildings. Mr. Cochran declared El Paso had been given rates much below the average on account of the long competition and because it was believed to be a good field. In Orange he said the same conditions were responsible for low rates, although not justified, for while El Paso had remained a profitable field, the companies lost in Orange. The hearing was concluded this afternoon. The result will probably be a reduction in rates.

### ANGLO-AMERICAN ALLIANCE

DUKE OF SUTHERLAND ADVOCATES COMPACT.

Englishman, Who Strikingly Resembles Andrew Carnegie, and One of England's Wealthiest Peers.

New York, June 24.—The Duke of Sutherland, who strikingly resembles Andrew Carnegie and is known as one of the wealthiest men of the English nobility, was in New York today on his way to Canada to look after personal business matters. He is an earnest advocate of an alliance between Great Britain and the United States and pointed out to his interviewers the advisability of such a union.

"The two great English speaking nations ought to stand shoulder to shoulder in the tremendous work ahead of the world," he said. "I do not mean that they should enter into a written and sealed alliance but simply that they should make what we might call a gentleman's agreement. This could be done without violating any of the rules of international amity and as respects other nations. It would preserve the world's peace and give an impetus to the growth of a higher civilization throughout the world."

### SECURES INJUNCTION.

Corporation Commission Ordered Not to Interfere With Railroad Rates. McAlester, Okla., June 24.—The Federal court injunction was invoked against the corporation commission again when, on application of the Oklahoma Central railway, Judge Ralph E. Campbell today granted a temporary restraining order directing the commission not to attempt to enforce its freight and passenger rates on the road mentioned, which is a domestic corporation, but which is in the hands of a Federal receiver. The commission was given notice Tuesday but was not represented at the hearing preceding the issuance of injunction here today.

### MAY REMAIN IN AMERICA

IMPROBABLE PORTER CHARLTON WILL BE EXTRADITED.

Representatives of Foreign Government Want Man Who Killed Wife Returned to Italy.

New York, June 24.—Apparently unconcerned over his desperate plight, Porter Charlton, the young bank clerk, who stands the confessed murderer of his wife, Mrs. May Scott Charlton, at Lake Como, spent a comparatively restful night in a cell in the Hoboken jail, where he was lodged after being arrested on the North German Lloyd line pier and taken aboard his arrangement in the recorder's court today.

The Italian officials expected to ask for Charlton's extradition to Italy where he would be tried for the murder of his wife. Here from Washington to appear in the case was Marquis Di Giarra, the Italian charge d'affaires, who had with him the Italian vice consul in New York, Gustavo Di Rosi.

It was expected that opposition to Charlton's extradition would hinge on the young man's physical and mental condition. "He is a consumptive boy, whose actions point to an un sound mind," was the way in which the prisoner was characterized by his father. Proof of such a condition of affairs, it was thought in some quarters, might even influence the Italian government to forego its extradition demand and it is considered certain it will weigh heavily with action to be taken up on any such demand by Washington authorities.

Early application for the examination of Charlton by alienists was one of the indicated developments in the case today.

### MAY FILE A MOTION

MAY TRY TO PREVENT MANLEY FROM SECURING FREEDOM.

Attorney States Manley Will Have no Trouble in Securing the Required Bail.

Dallas, Tex., June 24.—Indications are that before fifteen days are up the state through the county attorney will file a motion for a rehearing in the Manley case in an effort to keep Manley from being allowed bail which was fixed at \$7500 by the court of criminal appeals yesterday, following a narrow corpus hearing. Assistant County Attorney Savage said a long distant telephone conversation this morning with Assistant Attorney General Mobley in regard to the case, but Mr. Savage stated after the talk that no definite decision was reached as to whether a motion for a rehearing should be filed. It is stated, one of the attorneys for Manley, stated this morning that Manley would have no trouble in giving the required amount of bond, when asked what would be the probable outcome if a motion for a rehearing was filed he expressed the opinion that the only result would be a delay in securing Manley's freedom on bond. It is pointed out that the higher court has adjourned now until October and if the motion is filed the result will be that the motion would not be considered before the court again convened at Austin in that month.

### MRS. SCOTT DEAD.

Passed Away at Her Home in Mt. Pleasant.

Major Beckham received a dispatch from Mrs. Scott, at Mt. Pleasant, yesterday which stated that his mother, Mrs. Sallie Stogall Scott died at noon yesterday.

Mrs. Scott was born in Mississippi in 1840, and came to Greenville in 1887, where she lived until two years ago when she moved to Mt. Pleasant with her son and his family. Mrs. Scott had been an invalid for years. Mrs. Scott was a Christian lady and was highly esteemed by a wide circle of friends here.

The corpse will reach here on the 2:07 p. m. train today and will be taken to East Mount cemetery where services will be conducted by the former pastor, Rev. J. M. Holmquist, of Hillsboro.

### TICKETS BY AIR LINE.

Zeppelin's Drigible Deutschland to Make Regular Trips in Germany. New York, June 24.—Tickets by the Air Line between Düsseldorf and Baden, Germany, good only on the Zeppelin Drigible Deutschland, will be placed on sale here this week.

The Deutschland recently made a remarkable flight from Friederichshafen to Düsseldorf, about 250 miles, outdistancing the express trains between the same points. She is the first attempt to attempt a regular passenger service.

### STONEBURNER IS NAMED

SUPERINTENDENT FOR DALLAS HILLSBORO DIVISION OF KATY.

Stoner Will Retire From Present Position on July 1.—Not Certain as to His Future Course.

Denton, Tex., June 24.—George B. Stoner, division superintendent of the Katy south end from Denton to Hillsboro, embracing the Fort Worth and Henrietta divisions, Sherman and Cleburne branches, Dallas and Denison divisions and the Bonham branch, has resigned, effective Friday, July 1. Mr. Stoner will take a much needed rest before re-entering railroad circles again, not having had a lay off for many years. He has not decided as yet where he will locate after his vacation.

Mr. Stoner will be succeeded here by W. J. Stoneburner, who has been superintendent of the Quincy, Omaha & Kansas City Railroad since 1902. This is probably the first case in several years where the Katy has departed from its custom of changing officials. Years ago it imported almost all men for important positions, drawing many from the Wisconsin Central. However, of late years the practice has been to promote men from its own ranks, a fact which has been noticeable among railroad people in general. The naming of Mr. Stoneburner is a departure from the recent practice of the Katy.
