TEXAS COUNTIES CENSUS.

Three Show Gains and One a Loss Over Census of 1900.

Washington, July 5.—The Texas News Service correspondent this morning was informed at the census bureau that the following figures on Texas' population were available today: Delta county, 14,566; Franklin county, 9,231; Hood county, 10,008; Hopkins county, 10,686. Each of the foregoing counties show a gain over the 1900 census except Delta, which lost 753.

CLASH AFTER THE FIGHT

RESULT OF BOUT ENGENDERS RACE FEELING OVER COUNTRY

In Washington City Marine Corps Has Throat Cut During Battle With Negroes.

Washington, July 5.—In a fight last night resulting from clashes between negroes and whites over the champion ship battle at Reno, Thomas Milder, an enlisted man in the United States marine corps, had his throat cut and is at the casualty hospital in a serious condition.

Another white man was found unconscious last night in Pennsylvania avenue after a free-for-all fight. He was taken to a hospital where it was discovered he had sustained a concussion of the brain.

NEGRO LEFT RENO, NEV.

JEFFRIES \$100,000 RICHER—JOHNSON WANTS ANOTHER FIGHT.

Negroes of Reno Had Backed Jeffries And Are Not So Very Happy.

Reno, Nev., July 5.—Jack Johnson, with his bass viol, his trainers and camp equipment, is speeding toward Chicago on his special car, Redondo, and will reach Chicago Thursday morning. He is under contract to fight vaudeville engagements for a time and says he will be glad to get another fight soon but so far as he can learn no man in the world is really eager to get into the ring with him.

Jim Jeffries, wealthy farmer, will leave for his home in Southern California on his special car, Graymont, at 7:30 o'clock tonight. As a result of the fight he is probably \$100,000 richer.

The negro population of Reno is not near so happy today as might be expected, for many of them risked their money on Jeffries. Johnson is not a hero among most of his race who have met him.

Sam Berger, manager of the defeated champion, said today: "Jeffries, of course, is bitterly disappointed. He feels like he said after the fight, that the weight of public opinion drove him back into the ring and his failure may not be viewed leniently, although he knows he did his best. Jeffries is in good spirits, considering his disappointment. He is going back to home life."

As he walked around his house this morning, his stride seem noticeably unsteady and his big head hung down on his breast. The swelling around his eye was very evident and there were numerous slight bruises and contusions around his nose and mouth.

TO PROHIBIT FIGHT PICTURES.

Fort Worth Commission Directs Counsel to Prepare Ordinance.

Fort Worth, Tex., July 5.—Following the recommendation made by Mayor W. D. Davis at a meeting of the city commission this morning, the commission by a unanimous vote adopted the resolution directing the corporation counsel to prepare an ordinance which will prohibit the display of moving picture shows in Ft. Worth. The resolution was adopted after a long discussion. Mayor Davis, in an address to the commission, referred to the press dispatches telling of various race riots and the general wide spread trouble between the blacks and whites as a result of the controversies over the merits of the respective pugilists yesterday. He said he was a friend of moving picture shows as institutions, believing they do good, but he thinks it better to have the pictures censored. He declared if the right sort of pictures are shown, he is in favor of permitting them to be open Sundays, as in some other cities over the state, but he asserted the showing of the scenes of fight will have a bad influence and engender a feeling which is likely to cause a repetition of the scenes in various parts of the United States as a result of the fight.

WAGNER TO QUIT PLACE.

Will Devote Time to Legislative Matters.

Austin, Tex., July 5.—H. G. Wagner, deputy labor commissioner, today returned the report given out at Temple that he would resign his position as soon as his successor is named by Labor Commissioner Myers.

EXECUTION FOR MURDER

AND EMBEZZLEMENT OF FUNDS AT GERMAN LEGATION.

Wilhelm Beckert, Former Chancellor, Was Shot to Death at Santiago, Chile.

Santiago, Chile, July 5.—Wilhelm Beckert, former chancellor of the German legation, was shot here today for the murder of the Chilean messenger of the legation on February 5, 1909. Beckert embezzled funds of the legation and attempted to cover up his crime by making it appear that he had been burned to death. He murdered the messenger and left the body in the legation building at the same time disappearing himself. He was captured before he left the country.

WOMAN DIES FROM BURNS.

Mrs. G. C. Duncan, Burned June 25 Died Yesterday in Dallas.

Dallas, July 5.—As the result of burns received on June 25, Mrs. Georgia Grasty Duncan, wife of Grady C. Duncan, died at an early hour this morning at the J. M. Duncan home in West Dallas. The funeral services were held this afternoon at 4 o'clock at the West Dallas Christian church, and Elder L. S. White conducted the services. Interment was made in the West Dallas cemetery.

Mrs. Duncan was the youngest daughter of Elder G. Q. Grasty of Grand Prairie. She was eighty years of age and had only been married eight months. Besides her husband she is survived by her father, G. Q. Grasty, two brothers, J. Milton Grasty of Oak Cliff and Minor Grasty of Grand Prairie, and one sister, Mrs. L. B. Coward of West Dallas. She was a very popular young woman in the neighborhood where she resided and her death has caused considerable sorrow in that community.

The accident which finally culminated in the death of Mrs. Duncan occurred a little more than a week ago when Mrs. Duncan was in the act of lighting a fire in the kitchen stove. In order to build a fire quickly she poured some oil in the stove and it is presumed that these were live coals in the fire box. At any rate the oil ignited and the blaze extended to Mrs. Duncan's clothes. She was severely burned about the back and other parts of her body before the flames could be extinguished.

Medical attention was immediately secured and everything possible was done in an effort to save her life, but after lingering until this morning at an early hour, her suffering was relieved by death.

DR. HYDE SENTENCED.

Life Imprisonment is Penalty Assessed by Kansas City Court.

Kansas City, Mo., July 5.—Dr. Hyde, convicted of having poisoned Colonel Thomas Swope, the millionaire philanthropist, was sentenced to life imprisonment at hard labor, by Judge Lushaw, in the criminal court here this morning.

An appeal to the state supreme court has been filed by Hyde's attorney and until it is taken up the higher court the prisoner will remain in the county jail here. The doctor and his wife, who has stood by him faithfully, sat side by side and held each other's hands. Judge Lushaw promptly overruled the motion for the arrest of judgment and command of Hyde to stand up. Judge Lushaw said he could not grant bail. The prisoner will be kept in the county jail until the supreme court has passed finally on his case, which may not be for six months.

NEGRO WAS STRUNG UP

TEXAS POSSE CAPTURES BLACK WHO ATTEMPTED ASSAULT.

Attacked Bride of Three Months Who Drove Him Away With a Knife.

Houston, Tex., July 5.—The body of a negro was found hanging to a tree in the Richland creek bottom today. He was a negro who had attempted to assault the wife of Jim Bailey, a merchant at Rodney, near Corsicana, yesterday. Mrs. Bailey, bride of three months, snatched the negro and secured a knife which he had and forced the negro to flee. He was captured by a posse.

BABY FOUND NEAR WRECK. Was Hurling Unhurt Into a Corn Field and Found Yesterday.

Middleton, Ohio, July 5.—A seven-month-old baby, alive and uninjured, was found this morning in the corn field adjoining the scene of the Big Four passenger wreck in which 23 persons lost their lives. The child had been there since a wrecked yesterday afternoon, when it is believed it was hurled into the field in the collision.
