SENATE ON THE QUI VIVE

GOVERNOR MAY HAVE SOME THING TO COMMUNICATE.

Von Rosenberg is Now Commissioner of Insurance and Banking.

Austin, Tex., Aug. 3.—When the senate met this morning, Senator Harper called up and had passed his bill providing for a transfer of the pure feed fund of the Agricultural and Mechanical college to the available fund, which amounts to \$105,000. This money is to be used for the construction of a boy's dormitory at the college.

Senator Cofer called before the senate the joint resolution ratifying the 16th amendment to the Federal constitution relative to the imposition of an income tax, and had it passed to its third reading. It will be passed finally tomorrow.

Senator Hudspeth's bill to repeal the existing fire rating board law came up for consideration, and Senator Brachfield objected to the bill being considered now. He contended that if the present law is repealed and no other law is passed to take its place, it will leave the insurance companies to continue in the charging of an exorbitant rate. His motion that the bill be postponed until tomorrow morning prevailed.

The chair appointed Senators Peeler and Brachfield to receive Governor Sanders of Louisiana, who will arrive here tomorrow. Senate then went into an executive session to confirm the appointment of Frederick C. von Rosenberg as commissioner of insurance and banking.

After the executive session it was announced that the senate had confirmed the appointment of Von Rosenberg as commissioner of insurance and banking. As the executive session lasted nearly an hour it is believed that other matters were discussed, but nothing has come to light. The senate is expected to take some action relative to the recalling of the resignation of Moley as assistant attorney general and Jenkins as judge of the court of civil appeals, both of whom are said to have been reconstitutinally appointed. An opinion on the subject from the attorney general has not yet been completed.

SLEEPS WELL IN PRISON

DD. CRIPPEN IN GOOD SPIRITS WHEN HE AWOKES.

Friends of Accused Man Have Retained an Attorney in London, Cablegram to That Effect.

Quebec, Aug. 3.—Dr. Crippen slept well last night and appeared in most gratifyingly good spirits, when he awoke at 6 o'clock this morning. He had breakfast an hour later. The prisoner spends his days reading and walking in the jail corridor. Miss Levee, jointly charged with Crippen with murder, remained today in the prison infirmary. She is being kept there not because her condition any longer demands it, but that she may be in contact with other women prisoners who might, the police fear, annoy her and so aggravate her extreme nervousness.

Crippen Has Friends.

Quebec, Aug. 3.—Dr. Hawley Harvey Crippen has friends in London who believe he did not slay his wife, Belle Elmore, and they are willing to pay for a lawyer to defend him when he is tried for murder. He received proof of this last night when the jailer handed him the following cablegram from a London solicitor: "Dr. H. B. Crippen, Care of Inspector Dew, Quebec: Your friends desire me to defend you and will pay all necessary expenses. Will undertake your defense, but you must promise to keep absolute silence and answer no questions and don't resist extradition. Reply, confirming, as good deed must be done at once. Arthur Newton, Solicitor, London."

This unexpected message brought to the accused dentist in his lonely cell, the first gleam of hope since his arrest Sunday on the steamer Montrose with his companion in flight, Ethel Clare Levee, and by coincidence, the bearer of these good tidings was Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard, who Sunday, crushed the fugitive's hopes of escape.

A Noted Minister.

Dr. I. Alexander, chaplain of the A. and M. College at Bryan, was in the city yesterday. He was on his way from Boham to Pittsburg and Henderson. Dr. Alexander is one of the oldest Methodist ministers in the state having preached before the civil war.
