COURSE OF THE CONVENTION AT GALVESTON.

The management of the second day's events happily saved Mr. Colquitt from the obscurity which the proceedings of the first day at Galveston seemed to make imminent. His movement is deemed as if the only distinction he might get out of the occasion would be that which the convention could not withhold, notwithstanding that of laying his name out in the top of the ticket. Fortunately, however, the delirium of horsewhoring were on sufficiently the second day to make man half sensible of the incongruity of keeping all the honors on one who, nominally at least, was enlisted on the losing side of the recent contest. Accordingly, in addition to conferring on Mr. Colquitt the gavel he had won from the people, the convention permitted him to impress the platform here and there lightly with the ideas that he had exemplified so firmly during the campaign. It is evident, though, that even in matters of State policy he was made to yield somewhat as a means of subserving the political fortunes of Senator Bailey.

However much the regret, we have no hesitation in saying that probably before has there been a political convention ready to sacrifice so much of its dignity to the will of a single member of the party. Whether this was an exhibition of loyalty or merely of servility must, of course, depend on the viewpoint. But if one could spur his imagination up to the point of supposing that the course of the Galveston convention reflects the sentiments of its voters, he would have reason to believe that, to meet the exigencies of the next two years the party is willing to stoop that it may thereby give the appearance of heroic stature to one of its members. Not only has the mountain shown an anomalous readiness to respond to the beck of Mahomet, but, in the evening to pursue a course that contradicts its record and professions of the past. How long a party which permits itself to be kept in this abject posture can retain the respect of the free independent and patriotic citizens of this State, we shall not guess, but we venture the prediction that the need of retreating from the control of men who are willing to make it subservient to a single individual will soon impress itself on the minds of the masses of its voters.

We make no indictment against the party for what has been done at Galveston. For nearly two years now Senator Bailey and his lieutenants have gone up and down the State preaching contempt for conventions and disregard of platforms. We can not excuse their desperate exertions to control this convention and write its plato in except on the hypothesis that they wanted to demonstrate the truth of their preachers—Dallas News.

WILL THEY BE REBUKED?

More than a thousand of the best citizens of Hunt County petitioned Hon. H. F. Looney to run for the leg席 in order that he might lead the fight of the prohibitionists in the special session now at work in Austin. He consented, was almost unanimously elected, and, when he arrived at Austin, was immediately selected by the prohibition forces in the legislature to lead the fight. Bills were at once prepared covering the various laws Judge Poindexter claimed to favor in the recent race for governor—the quar law, the night closing law and a law prohibiting drinking liquor in the place where sold; these were all introduced and Mr. Looney, after his great debate with Judge Robertson, had the liquor forces completely whipped. This was the condition at the close of last week. Then came the Galveston convention and a union of Colquitt and Poindexter forces. These forces controlled the convention and demanded that the legislators adjourn without acting on a single one of these measures. How does that strike the good prohibitionist who voted for Judge Poindexter under the impression that the forces behind him really desired the destruction of the liquor traffic? The great body of those who supported him so desired and were earnest and sincere. Many believed that Johnson

was not a good prohibitionist and for that reason were unwilling to support him. Yet when the battle is over and when it is shown that the prohibitionists were, if united, largely in the majority, the politicians controlling the Poindexter forces instead of combining with the Johnson prohibition forces and getting in the platform, the laws favored by Poindexter which he was making the race, joined hands with the Colquitt whisky forces and set the whisky men run rough shod over everything. Real prohibitionists, honest democrats and fair minded men have a right to complain at such inexcusable conduct, at such a surrender of the cause for which they fought. The question now is will they permit such conduct to go unbroken?

OUTRAGING PUBLIC SENTIMENT.

This great prohibition district—the fifth—was represented on the platform committee at the Galveston convention by an anti-prohibitionist. The district is for prohibition by about five to one and went against Colquitt by about that majority, still W. V. Carver of Farmersville, an anti-prohibitionist and a "local self-government" Colquitt man represented it in making our platform. It may be that none but Colquitt and Poindexter Barley men were capable of representing Hunt county at that convention as has been claimed, but it can be safely said that had Johnson men had any voice in the Hunt county delegation no anti-subversionist or anti-prohibitionist would have represented that county on the platform committee. They are not able to understand the necessity or propriety of such conduct.

The street car people are ready and waiting to begin work. Money necessary to induce these people to build this street car system was subscribed by our citizens and all that remains to be done is for each party to pay in what he subscribed. Every man who refuses to pay is responsible for delay at the beginning of the work. This car system means much to this town. It will immediately put a great deal of money in circulation, give work to a great many men and will, when completed, be an institution not only of great convenience to our people but will place our city on an equality with others of similar size. Do not delay further but pay the committee the amount subscribed and let the work begin.

With the completion of the government building the construction of the Masonic Temple and the K. of P. building, the building of the street car system and the paving that is being prepared for, Greenville is going to make the best showing this year of any city of similar population in the state.

Let those who subscribed for the street car pay up. Do not delay further the beginning of this work.

It does not pay to lag behind. Get a move on you.
