THE OPENING OF BURLISON

DEVOTIONAL AND INTRODUCTORY EXERCISES YESTERDAY.

Classes Arranged in the Afternoon. Athletics Will be Taught. Library Advantages.

Burlison College opened yesterday morning for its fifth year, with devotional exercises conducted by Rev. A. A. Duncan, pastor of the First Baptist church.

This was followed by several musical numbers, and a number of addresses, covering the school, the college, the future, and the mission of the college, and also the various departments of the college. Miss Virginia Lee, secretary of education and expression, gave a reading that showed the educational progress. Miss Grace Tappan, the new teacher of art, and our specimens show rare talent. On the platform were seated all the faculty, both history and fine arts, the trustees and friends. Of the faculty in the jury department there were present: President E. L. Compere, Prof. W. L. Gibson, Prof. J. E. Abney, Prof. J. C. Smith, Miss Jennie Spilawa, Miss Edna Stotelder. Representing the trustees were R. N. White, W. M. McFarland, W. H. James, R. F. Jones, P. P. Wood, E. D. Reece, Dr. W. C. Moody, G. W. Apperson, of Commerce. Others on the platform were Rev. A. A. Duncan, Rev. H. E. Harris, Prof. J. A. Thomas and Hubert M. Harrison.

President E. L. Compere made some appropriate opening remarks and was followed in short talks by Supt. J. A. Thomas, Rev. E. D. Reece and Hubert Harrison, all predicting a bright future for Burlison, and the influence it will have on Greenville and its county, both spiritually and educationally.

The afternoon was spent in arranging the classes. The audience was informed that a bookstore has been equipped where the students can obtain books and supplies. A library has been established which will be in charge of Miss Spilawa.

Prof. Smith discussed athletics, and proposed thorough practice in all seasons sports. The session opened with an enthusiastic spirit exhibited by the faculty and pupils which speaks well for a prosperous scholastic year.

Neither America Nor Great Britain Contest the Award of The Hague.

The Hague, Sept. 13.—The award of the international court of arbitration in the Newfoundland fisheries case became irrevocable today with the expiration of the five days allowed for appeal without either the United States or Great Britain having entered a protest against the findings.

MYSTIC TRIBE OF MONTEZUMA

Meeting of Officers and Board of Supervisors Last Night.

The officers and members of Board of Supervisors of the Mystic Tribe of Montezuma met last night and went over the plans of the organization, and the business management of the order. The security of the funds for payment of insurance policies and benefits was thoroughly investigated. The organization is under the laws of the State of Texas, which is very strict as to safe-guarding the insurance department of such orders. PROCEEDINGS OF COUNCIL

PASSED EMERGENCY ORDINANCE ON STRINGING WIRES.

An Ordinance on Sewer Connecting by Property Within One Hundred Feet of Main.

The City Council met yesterday in regular weekly session with all members present.

Permission was granted the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company to sell certain of their poles on the north side of the square and on St. John street, to the Greenville Power and Manufacturing Company.

An ordinance was passed on emergency to take effect today, to prohibit the stringing of wires within three feet of electric light wires, or any other high potential wires. Also requiring all persons, firms and corporations now owning or controlling wires, to move same within three days, under a penalty of not less than \$50 nor more than \$200. This applies to any agent or person acting for them, and takes effect today.

An ordinance was passed to second reading requiring all property owners within one hundred feet of a sewer main, to be connected within twenty days after notice is given under a penalty of not less than \$50 nor more than \$100.00.

A petition was read asking the repeal of the ordinance placing a tax on the sale of fish, oysters and dressed poultry. Also on the sale of fresh pork by farmers. This petition was laid over until the next meeting.

KATY HOG SPECIAL.

Arrived in the City Early Yesterday Morning.

The Katy "Hog Special" arrived at 5:30 o'clock yesterday morning and is located just north of the passenger depot. The car is in charge of T. L. Pocher, Katy industrial agent, W. N. King of the Fort Worth stock yards, and H. E. Singleton, of McKinney, an authority on hog breeding.

The specimens of hogs are Poland Chittas and Jersey Reds. Good crowds have been in attendance at the early morning talks by Mr. Singleton full of good information.

The train will leave at 11 o'clock this morning for Farmersville and McKinney, and will return in a few days and go down to Mineola. The object is to arouse interest of the farmers in raising their own meat.

CHURCH OF THE NAZARENE

GENERAL ASSEMBLY MAY MEET IN PENIEL NEXT YEAR.

One Thousand Visitors From Every State in the Union—Chance for Booster Club.

Rev. J. W. Goodwin and wife, of Los Angeles, Cal., are visiting at Peniel. Mr. Goodwin is district superintendent of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene, and will probably be elected a bishop at the next General Assembly.

C. A. McConnell, editor of the Pentecostal Advocate, at Peniel, stated to a Herald reporter that they are making strenuous efforts to have the General Assembly of the Church of the Nazarene, to meet at Peniel in 1911, and think everything is favorable to that end. There are three bishops in the church and two of them are favorable to Peniel. The only other place that is in the race is Nashville, Tenn.

The General Assembly consists of a little over four hundred delegates. Peniel can take care of half of the delegates and Greenville will be asked to take care of the other half. Besides the delegates there will be visitors who will number at least one thousand, but all outside of the delegates will pay their own way.

This is a chance for the Booster Club to get busy. The General Assembly will bring to Peniel, and of course Greenville, one thousand of the best class of people, men of education and talent, and their presence here for a week or ten days will be of untold benefit to the city.

The General Assembly meets but once in four years in the month of October, and next year is the time for the meeting. With the street cars running as they will be by that time, Peniel will be easily accessible to our people. Every state in the union will be represented and many men of wealth and large business connections from the New England and Northern states will be among the delegates. It is hoped the General Assembly will make the Holmes University their official church school for the South. Greenville cannot afford to let this opportunity slip by and as stated above the Booster Club can make this an object for which they can work.

KATY OPERATORS GET RAISE.

Men to Number of Several Thousand Will Benefit by Increase.

Denton, Tex., Sept. 13.—A wage increase for telegraph operators amounting to \$7.50 to \$15 monthly was today announced by the telegraph department of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway. This raise came from the company without action on the part of the men, and will affect several thousand employees, as the order is effective over the whole system.

COUNTY COURT.

Three Pleas of Guilty Were Taken Yesterday.

In the county court yesterday Dick Martin pleaded guilty to theft of clothing and was fined \$5 and costs, amounting to \$20, and ten days in jail.

Roy Alexander and Charles Lawrence both pleaded guilty to theft of clothing north of Commerce. Each was fined \$5 and costs. The three were sent to the county farm.

HALE HAS LOST HIS SEAL.

MAINE DEMOCRATS NOW HAVE MAJORITY IN JOINT BALLOT.

Control of Legislature is Very Important in This State.

Portland, Maine, Sept. 12.—Returns received up to 11:30 a. m. gave the democrats control of Maine's senate with 21 of the 31 seats. The Democrats also have elected 71 representatives out of a total house membership of 161. This gives the Democrats within five votes of a majority in the lower branch.

With a majority of eleven in the senate the Democrats are assured of control in the joint convention at which branches of the legislature which will elect a United States senator to succeed Senator Eugene Hale.

Control of the legislature is of more importance in Maine than in some other states because under the constitution a number of the highest state officers are chosen by that body. These are treasurer, attorney general, secretary and commissioner of agriculture.

The Democratic victory of yesterday extends even to minor state officers.

Today's returns show the Democrats elected thirteen of the sixteen highest officers in the state.
