FRIENDS AND FOES OF CORPORATIONS.

"Corporations and the development of Texas suffer because of two classes of men," says the Tyler Courier-Times. "One are the men who are prejudiced against capital, the other are the self-constituted defenders of corporations and capital. Of the two, we believe the latter the greater burden to the corporations. On all occasions they denounce our laws as the work of demagogues and pose as the only liberal minded men with sense and honesty enough to do justice by capital. They usually say they are too plain spoken to be elected to office, that they speak out and tell the truth and for that the people would not elect them. The supposition is that the voters are neither sensible nor fair in their dealings toward capital. The people look upon these men as corporate hirelings telegraph and telephone companies, makes them suspicious of corporation methods.

"The truth is if these two classes of men would shut up and let the people alone they would soon realize that corporations are a necessary part of the development of the country. That as for railroads, express companies, telegraph and telephone companies, these are as much under the control of the people as their courts, houses and the state house at Austin. These people would soon realize their power to regulate these corporations is as absolute as that they may well be considered the people's property, operated by the owners under the rules and regulations of the people. Then are the facts and there is no sense of cause for any citizen to denounce these corporations, which can and do much good and no harm. Without them no country could advance and with them the gates to development are wide open."

CENSORSHIP OF FILMS.

The popularity of motion pictures shows has grown steadily not only in Greenville but throughout the country. Locally Mr. Lamkin has always endeavored to secure the best grade of films but at times he has had to take what he could get, the good along with the bad. To those who have attended Mr. Lamkin's motion picture entertainments the marked improvement in the moral tone of the films now in use over those available in the past is most noticeable, all of which is that much gain for the community. The reason of this improvement is that the films used locally have all been censored. A recent bulletin of the People's Institute of New York announces that out of that organization has been formed the National Board of Censorship of Motion Pictures. This board co-operates with the manufacturers in a manner that is practical and exceedingly clever. Manufacturers who uniformly submit to censorship are permitted to advertise that fact. Those who do not follow the recommendations of the censoring body lose its approval.

After telling of the formation of the board in March, 1909, for work in New York City, the bulletin recognizes the details of the extension of that work, concluding: "The board of censorship thus began with purely local functions, but these were quickly made National at the request of the manufacturers of moving pictures."

The advisory committee includes many widely known names. The list is headed by Dr. Leman Abbott, includes Hamilton Holt, Samuel Dornpers, Jacob H. Schiff and half a score more widely known names.

There are still many films going the rounds which left the central offices before the censorship was organized. The board reports that its work is proceeding in a very satisfactory manner in spite of the fact that censorship of these pictures requires a great deal of time. In giving the list of manufacturers and importers who submit to censorship the board remarks that it includes about 90 per cent of the pictures shown in this country. This is pleasing information. It predicts the end of objectionable moving picture films.

A Kansas editor tried the experiment of telling the unvarnished truth in his journal one week. He did not get beyond the first day. This he learned on Monday. Married, Miss Sylvia Rhoads to James (Commons) last Sunday evening at the Baptist church. The bride was an ordinary town girl, who does not know more than a rabbit about cooking and never helped her mother three days in her life. She is not a beauty by any means and has a gut like a duck. The bridegroom is an up-to-date loafer and has been living off the old folks all his life and don't amount to much below. They will have a hard time while they live together." AN AMUSING INCIDENT.

A Civil Jury Brought in a Criminal Case Verdict.

An amusing incident occurred at court in Sulphur Springs a year or two ago which is worth relating. In the district court a civil case was on trial. The case was closed and the jury sent out about supper time. There was a negro in jail awaiting trial for assault and while everybody was away at supper the judge had the negro brought into court and called the jury out of their room to act as a jury in the criminal case as the negro was to plead guilty, which he did and the jury went on to return a verdict in the case of the negro.

The defendant in the civil case seeing the court room lighted up came in to see if a verdict would be rendered in his case, and knew nothing of the other case. He seated himself and in a few minutes there was a knock on the door and the jury announced themselves ready with the verdict. The jury came before the judge and as the district clerk was about the judge took the verdict and read it aloud. "We, the jury and the defendant guilty and assess his punishment in confinement in the penitentiary for life."

When the civil case defendant heard the verdict he turned pale, threw up his hands and exclaimed, "My God! Mein Gott!"


