So we decided to have the meetings in the homes—invite the women to the meetings and we had hardly gotten started when we changed pastors and that caused some delay in getting the home meetings well attended though the interest was increasing. But not until we elected Sister Hilton president in September of that year did our C. W. B. M. increase in membership and get the missionary spirit aroused in the women of our church. To her is due the credit of leading us out into broader fields of usefulness. I believe Sister Hilton has the faculty of getting the best service out of people, which is a happy gift. When she came to us we had two little men, perhaps now we have eight. We had an enrollment of 17 now we have 81, quite a creditable increase in three years. It is with sincere regret that we are losing Sister Hilton, but what is our loss will be another's gain. For I am sure she will not be idle in this great work of sending the gospel message and we wish to commend her to her new field as one who is able and efficient in all lines of Christian work. We shall wish her wise counsel and inspiring talks at our meetings but we will console ourselves knowing that she is working in another part of the Lord's vineyard. And we wish her Godspeed in her new field of labor. Our prayers and good wishes shall follow her. We shall always remember with love and kindness her stay with us, and the inspiration she gave in our beloved C. W. B. M. work. We don't like to say goodbye but will say that God of all grace be with us all.

It has been a joy to us for a time, but we have enjoyed that letter to the extent of ownership. And now we feel that we are extending that letter to another congregation who we hope will appreciate you as we have. We don't want to feel as though you are going among strangers.

And we hope that you do not feel that way, but only going to a band of sisters in Christ Jesus who are laboring for the advancement of Christ Kingdom on earth.
