adulteration. This duty is con-
fided to the State Board of
Health, which board has ap-
pointed eight chemists to make
the investigation, each chemist
to confine his attention to cer-
tain lines of articles. Among
the articles which it is propos-
ed to investigate first are: olive
oil, castile soap, wine, beer,
lard and mustard. Most of
these adulterations, the commit-
tee declare, are not dangerous
to the health. It is proposed,
however, that adulterated food
articles shall be sold for what
they really are—that glucose
shall not be sold as sugar, oleo-
margarine as butter and cot-
ton seed oil as olive oil.
