

STATE NEWS.

—Electric lights are now in operation at Bryan.

—Dallas is jubilant over her artesian water.

—The Falls county fair opens on the 15th instant.

—N. T. Lake's stables in Dallas burned Saturday night.

—The Amarrillo fair opened Sunday and will close to-day.

—The crop outlook throughout the state is much improved.

—A large cotton crop is being gathered in Gaudalupe county.

—Hallettsville has awarded the contract for a system of water works.

—R. W. Rawles died at Groesbeck of excessive drinking last Saturday.

—Hon. R. Q. Mills spoke at Conway in the Second Arkansas district Saturday.

—The army worm is depredating upon the wheat and cotton crops of Jacksboro.

—The cotton crop of Fannin county is turning out much better than expected.

—The Terry Texas rangers will hold their reunion at Bastrop on the 28th.

—Fifteen hundred bales of cotton have been shipped from Richmond, Tex., this season.

—N. T. Bridges is under arrest at Dallas charged with stealing a show tent and all its traps.

—St. Louis men have offered to put up \$200,000 to print a daily alliance paper in Texas.

—Local capitalists are organizing a national bank at Black Jack, Tex., with a capital of \$50,000.

—The international fair closed at San Antonio Saturday. It has been a very successful one.

—A merchant at Gonzales by the name of Freyer made an assignment Saturday night.

—A large catamount was found under the University building at Waco last week and killed.

—A small boy at El Paso, while trying to feed a lion in a circus, had his hand and arm badly lacerated.

—The first issue of the Shiner Courier will make its appearance next Thursday the 16th inst.

—J. D. Jones, of Livingston, died Sunday night from wounds received in a difficulty the week before.

—A small child of W. Wesserman fell in a tub of water Saturday at Dallas, and was drowned.

—It is believed at Dallas that the crooks of the country are congregating at Dallas to take in the fair.

—A serious wreck occurred near Columbus, Tex. Two freight trains and engines were badly smashed up.

—Hon. Roger Q. Mills will return to Texas at once and speak at several points in his district during the month.

—Chas. D. Clark accidentally shot and killed himself while out hunting three miles west of Sherman Sunday.

—The ticket office at Mexia was robbed Sunday night of \$82.65. Two negroes have been arrested on suspicion.

—The large irrigating works being put up by the North Laredo company are reported to be progressing finely.

—The county of Calhoun, Tex., has in ten years decreased over half the number of inhabitants it contained in 1880.

—There is talk of building a railroad from Albany to Vernon shortly. It will be known as the "Cattle Trail Route."

—At Ennis, Texas, the other day a farmer named Sanderson swallowed carbolic acid for whisky and died in a few minutes.

—Cotton in Eastland county has been injured some by the rains, but farmers have taken advantage of it to sow their wheat.

—All efforts are being made at Waco to entertain the delegates to the Real Estate Convention which meets there on the 16th.

Report comes from Elysian Fields that Elijah Fortson and John Miller engaged in a cutting affray at Bethany and that Miller was killed.

—It is quite a commentary on the age of the city that among the 500 pupils attending the Vernon schools not one of them was born in that town.

—An artesian well has just been completed at Dallas with an estimated flow of 600,000 gallons a day.

—The first year's work on the deep-water harbor at Galveston will cost about \$1,000,000, according to estimates of the chief of engineers.

—G. R. West, a prominent stock man of Nolan county, has disposed of his stock interest to his partner, George Breedlove, for the sum of \$12,000.

—At a meeting of the citizens of Galveston Thursday night for the purpose of raising funds to alleviate the suffering in Ireland \$1347 was raised.

—At Tyler, Monday, Weathersly, was sentenced to five years imprisonment for the killing of Pope at Marshall. He has made application for a new trial.

—The Chatauqua and seaside camp-meeting at Corpus Christi, opened with a good attendance. Bishop Key, of Georgia was expected to arrive by Wednesday.

—A boy followed the circus from Los Angeles Cal., to El Paso, where his mother Mrs. Herritt overtook him and carried him home. He was very glad to return.

—The governor Saturday reappointed C. L. Cleveland judge and appointed M. A. Royston district clerk of the Galveston criminal district court.

—A site has been purchased for the Alexander institute in Henderson, Rusk county, and the building will be erected and ready for school by the first of January.

—The yield of cotton in the neighborhood of Whitesboro is much better than was estimated, and prices average about a cent more per pound than last year.

—Very heavy rains have fallen recently in Rains county and cotton pickers are greatly in demand, as there is more cotton than was expected, and it is opening very rapidly.

—Mrs. Minnie Nick, a German lady aged 62, fell from a pecan tree near Waco Sunday and broke her leg, the bone sticking in the ground. She stayed there two hours and had bound up her leg in very good shape.

—At McKinney last Saturday night Earl Franklin and Bill Stewart, two festive colored gentlemen attended a festival and became involved in a scrapping match, and Earl opened fire on Stewart, the ball striking Ben Washington in the head. All were promptly arrested.

—McLaughlin and Waters two men who were tried at Juarez about a year ago for the murder of a Mexican woman, appealed to the Supreme court, and were Sunday last discharged and lost no time in crossing over into El Paso. Walters was so weak he could scarcely speak.

—Another victim of the deadly coal oil can is reported. The 13-year-old daughter of G. W. Hooker, a farmer living near Lockhart, tried to kindle a fire by pouring oil on it from a can. She died in a few hours; her parents were severely injured trying to save her.
