A FRENCH electrical paper has a description of a novel electrical ventilating apparatus for supplying a building with fresh air, either warm or cold. A motor operates a ventilator, thus drawing the cold air in, but if warm air is desired, the electric current is sent through a net work of fine wires which becomes highly heated. The air is drawn through this network by the ventilator and comes out as warm as furnace heat. It is claimed that the hygienic results of such an arrangement are excellent.

—W. J. Staggs, who shot and killed Maj. J. T. Echols because Echols slapped him, in Comal county recently, had a preliminary hearing at Boerne, Kendall county Tuesday and was denied bail. The case will finally be tried at New Braunfels.

—The Lethro carbon company of New York City have closed negotiations for the purchase of 27,000 acres of land in Uvalde county, on which is situated the greater part of the new mineral deposits discovered a few months ago, and which created such a start in the world.
