Notice is hereby given that an election will be held within the limits of Justice's Precinct Number Three (3) of Marion County, Texas, within lawful hours, on to-wit:

Tuesday, September 6. A. D., 1904.

To determine whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in said Justice's Precinct Number Three (3) of Marion County, Texas. The Polls will be opened at Election Precinct Number Four (4) of Marion County, Texas, at County Court House at Jefferson, Texas, in said Justice's Precinct Number Three (3) of Marion County, Texas, and also at Election Precinct Number (5) Five of Marion County, Texas, at New Prospect Church in said Justice's Precinct Number Three (3) of Marion County, Texas. At said election those who favor the prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors within the limits of Justice's Precinct Number three (3) of Marion County, Texas, shall have written or printed on their tickets the words "For Prohibition," and those who oppose it shall have printed or written on their tickets the words "Against Prohibition."

Said election will be held in conformity with law regulating the holding of the same and in obedience to an order made by the Honorable County Commissioners Court of Marion County, Texas, August 9th, A. D., 1904.
