NORTHERN VETERANS REFUSE FRIENDSHIP.

Colonel Welch of Jefferson Nearly
Mobbed for Waving a Con-
federate Flag.

Special to Ft. Worth Record.
Columbus, O., Sept. 5.—Colonel
Horace Welch of Jefferson, Texas,
who travelled 2,000 miles to at-
tend the reunion of the Fourth
Ohio volunteer regiment, nearly
created a riot at the Memorial hall
this afternoon by waving a Con-
federate flag in the faces of the
fifty union veterans present.

Some treated the matter jokingly
but there were cries of "Shoot it!"
"Fire on the Flag!" as the emblem
of the cause they had fought
against for four long, bloody years
fluttered before their eyes.

Welch displayed the flag after he
had presented resolutions adopted
by General Dick Taylor Camp,
United Confederate Veterans, of
Jefferson, Texas expressing friend-
ship to the northern veterans and
asking them to visit Texas. No
action was taken on the resolution.

It was in a spirit of kindness
and christian charity that the Gen-
eral Dick Taylor Camp, of this
city, sent by Col. Welch resolu-
tions inviting the union soldiers to
visit the greatest state in the
Union. The flag was not sent by
the Camp, the Colonel obtained it
from a friend, thinking it would be
something of a curiosity, but from
the consternation it created, it is
very evident the fifty union sol-
diers present must have seen that
flag before, and the recollection of
what happened was more than
they could stand. A Confederate
flag in the hands of a union vet-
eran, surely it is not dangerous—
the old fright may have come up
again you know. Forty years has
passed, yet the sight demoralizes
them. No boys it will not hurt
you; we all claim the same flag
now. These Ohio veterans should
come south to learn the spirit of
forgiveness, charity and brotherly
love. Come and the old Confed-
erates will give you a hearty shake
of the hand, and promise you not
to show you any thing to remind
you of the past, or that will
frighten you. It is to be hoped
that Col. Welch will reach his
home in the Southland safely. It
is not thought he will show that
flag again.

Exchanges to Go.—The city council
at the demand of the citizens has de-
cided that no stock exchange, nor cot-
ton exchange, can do business in this
city. The demand for their abolition
was almost unanimous.

The form of gambling conducted by
the exchanges is the more dangerous
because it is respectable. There is no
liquor in the exchanges, no disreputable
people, no dark rooms, no gambling
tools. You bet your money and are
told that you have lost, or won, and
you accept the statement. Millions
of dollars have been lost to the South
every year since the war. As a rule the
game has not been fair, and the public
has come to realize that. Some of the
exchanges are straight and honorable
and really send in the orders and play
honestly. Too many of them do not.

Birmingham has resolved to do away
with them. The honest must suffer
with the dishonest and all must hunt
other cities and other dollars than ours.
—Birmingham Ledger.

Since the passage of the Anti-Bucket
Shop law by the Georgia legislature, a
howl is going up against speculation in
futures from nearly all the cotton and
grain producing states. The bucket
shop is doomed, not only in Georgia
