About Two Hundred Thousand Persons Monday.

WEATHER A DELIGHT

Naval Procession Up the River, a Gorgeous Parade Through Main Streets and French Opera House Hall Features.

New Orleans, Feb. 12.—With blue skies and the warm weather of a May day the glittering Mardi Gras carnival pageants were witnessed by fully 200,000 persons Monday. Following the traditional custom, Rex, king of the carnival, arrived via the Mississippi river in the afternoon, and the night was given up to Proteus and his Mystery Krew. With twenty gaudy floats, representing the Arabian Night Tales, the masked band of Proteus paraded the street. The story illustrated was that of the realm of the Queen of Serpents, the scenes including the giant, the strange fruits, the island of apes and the castle of Jewels.

Following the street parade the Krewe held its annual masked ball at the French Opera House, after which came the general ball, participated in by both the maskers and other society leaders.

TALE TOLD IN TEARS

New York, Feb. 7.—The announcement that either the mother or wife of Harry K. Thaw would be the principal witness in Thursday's proceedings brought out an unusually large crowd at the criminal court building. The corridors were filled and scores of people—many of them women—tried in every possible way to force themselves by the officers at the courtroom doors, but the bars were put up and few were allowed to pass. Over half a score of women succeeded in entering. They were attired in the gayest of costumes.

In answer to Mr. Delmas' first question Mrs. Thaw said she was born Dec. 25, 1843. She told of going to the Cate Martia to dinner on the evening of June 25 with her husband, Mr. McCaleb and Truxton Beale.

"He said: 'Well, well, they all seem to have turned us down.' He said: 'Never mind, we will eat alone.' Later I said I must go home. He said he would show me another part of the house and we went into a bedroom with mirrors all around."

"He gave me more champagne. Then everything became whirly and black. When I came to my senses I was all off. I screamed and screamed, but he kept telling me to stop, saying: 'It's over; it's all right.'"

"Mrs. Thaw promised, she said, that she would never tell her mother. He said it was all right; that there was nothing so nice as young girls who would do as they were told. You must never get fat."

Going back to her girlhood the prisoner's wife told the entire story of her life—how she was brought to New York by her mother and posed for famous artists to earn money for the family support. She also took a place in the chorus of a musical show, and it was while there she met White.

Mrs. Thaw said the effect of her story on Thaw was terrible. He sobbed and walked the floor and stayed up all night, sitting in the room talking it over.

BRYAN INVITED.

He is Asked to Address Both Houses of the Legislature.

Austin, Feb. 11.—Hon. W. J. Bryan has been invited by a concurrent resolution to address both houses of the legislature.

The house passed a bill authorizing the attorney general to examine the bonds of domestic and foreign corporations who he has reason to believe are operating in violation of the anti-trust laws.

The house engaged a bill to provide for the appointment of a board of state auditors to inspect the books of the state departments and make such recommendations as they shall deem proper to put the state on a more business-like basis.

A resolution was adopted inviting the attorney general to draw up such measures as in his judgment will reach trusts operating in Texas, mentioned in his recent communication to the legislature.

Mr. Love of Williamson introduced a resolution in the house providing for sine die adjournment of the legislature on March 13. It was laid on the table subject to call.

SALARIES SET.

Provision Creating an Eight-Hour Day Was Also Adopted.

Guthrie, Feb. 12.—The constitutional convention adopted a plank setting the salary of the justice of the supreme court of Oklahoma at \$4,000 and that of the district judges at \$3,000. The submission of the report of the committee which had this subject in charge caused a general debate.

Another provision creating an eight-hour day for men actually engaged in Oklahoma mines was accepted. The specification, "under persons who have interfered with members of the Cherokee nation of Indians sixty days in that to dispose of improvements they have placed on lands in the Cherokee nation, shall have been heretofore occupied. The sale of such improvements is to be made only to members of the Cherokee nation at a price not to exceed the value of the land as determined by the secretary of the interior."

LITTLE IN TEXAS.

Little Rock, Feb. 12.—Governor John S. Little, accompanied by his wife and two physicians, left his home at Greenwood for the Gulf coast of Texas in an endeavor to recuperate sufficiently to take charge of the legislative session here before the present legislative session has terminated. Six policemen were summoned and stood guard outside the house while the couple were married, and he escorted the bride and groom to their hotel. The ceremony was held by the Mexican altar.

JEWISH COLONISTS.

Movement to This End Has Been inaugurated at Ardmore.

Ardmore, Feb. 12.—Plans for the colonization of a large number of Jewish citizens in this section have been started here. Samuel Waldon, a representative of the Jewish immigration bureau at Galveston, is here on a conference with local citizens. It is planned to bring many from the congested districts and locate them on Indian lands. The movement will be encouraged locally.

TRAIN WRECKED.

One Man Killed and Eight Others Were Injured, Some Seriously.

Timpsen, Tex., Feb. 12.—The Waterman Lumber company train was wrecked here Monday. The cause is a widow—Oa—estahodrudufy, 6 not known. M. C. Luminus, who leaves a widow and five children, was killed. Eight other men were injured.

Oklahoma Catholics.

Kingslayer, Feb. 11.—The ecclesiastical conference of this province was concluded here at Catholic rectory, with Bishop Meerschbaert presiding. Statistics submitted show the new state will have a Catholic population of 27,922, with eighty-two clergymen of various ranks and orders.

Horse Stumbled, Rider Killed.

Elk City, Okla., Feb. 12.—The horse which Western West, seventeen years old, was riding, stumbled and fell. Young West's skull was broken, and he died.

Shawnee Lady Dies on Train.

San Antonio, Feb. 12.—Mrs. W. E. Smith of Shawnee, Okla., died on a train near here while en route for treatment.

The actual increase in assessed value was \$1,076,479,738, and this was on an average of 40 per cent of the true value. The amazing magnitude of this gain of \$7,300,000 a day is strikingly shown by the statement of the London Express, which, bemoaning the inability of Great Britain to keep pace with America's growth, put the increase in Great Britain's wealth at \$7,000,000 a week.

Contrast the South's increase of \$7,300,000 a day with Great Britain's \$7,000,000 a week and then think of the future.

Great Britain, with comparative few natural resources, dependent upon the outside world for nearly all its foodstuffs, for much of its iron ore, for all of its cotton and a large part of its lumber, and with only 10,000 square miles of coal, of which a large portion has been worked out, has 40,000,000 people crowded into an area of less than half of Texas.

FRANCIS QUESTIONED.

Former Secretary of the Interior Before Investigation Committee.

Austin, Feb. 9.—Hon. David R. Francis of St. Louis testified before the Bailey investigating committee Saturday. Senator Hanger read to the witness the second clause of the Cooke charges about the purchase of the Gibbs ranch. "Is that charge true?" asked Mr. Hanger. "Absolutely false," said Mr. Francis, "except that I did assist Bailey to buy the ranch."

Witness went on to say that he and Bailey were warm friends as they were different residences would permit. He said that in the latter part of 1899 or 1900, while Bailey was a member of the house, Bailey told him about an opportunity to buy a valuable tract near



Dallas and offered to go into the project with him (Francis). Witness replied that he had all the land at that time he wanted in Texas. Bailey suggested that they use part of the Francis land in the trade for the Gibbs ranch. Francis agreed to this and offered Bailey Pecan county lands, but could not go in with Bailey because his interest at that time was spread out. He offered to sell to Bailey the Pecan county land at \$1 per acre.

Witness said he did deed the land to Gibbs in 1900 and then Gibbs later deeded the land to him. He said this deed was defective and he neglected to straighten this matter out for some time.

In 1902 or 1903 witness heard his Pecan county lands were about to be sold for taxes. He said the Gibbs deed had not been recorded. He was very much provoked over the matter and went to Bailey. Bailey told him that he was to blame for the situation and he had to admit it. He paid about \$800 in back taxes and penalties. Gibbs made another deed and the property is now in his name.

Francis said he signed, from time to time, deeds of conveyance and release to the Gibbs ranch near Dallas. He said he had no recollection of the Dallas county lands was Bailey's purpose to secure his interests. "I would have let him have my land without security," said Francis.

Witness said he had nothing to conceal in the matter, but he believed Bailey had told him he did not want to sue him in a "political feud."

He saw Bailey in April, 1900, at St. Louis. Francis wired Bailey at Galveston before the time he arrived at St. Louis. Bailey wired back he would be there in a day or two. He believed that he gave Francis a letter of introduction to Bailey at St. Louis. That letter was a letter of writing Bailey to come to St. Louis.

Witness related matters leading up to the letter of introduction. He was a member of the same club with Francis at St. Louis known as the St. Louis club. Pierce was president and he was vice president. He also belonged to two country clubs. They were friends socially, but never had business relations. Some time in 1900 Pierce telephoned witness and asked for a conference. Pierce told Francis of the Gibbs ranch, and Francis wanted a Texas lawyer to help him. Francis recommended Joe Bailey.

"What? That Texas politician?" said Francis.

Francis said he gave Bailey a strong recommendation to Pierce and then wired Bailey to come to St. Louis. He said he would come. He said he gave Bailey either a letter of introduction or introduced him to Pierce. He denied this had anything to do with the Gibbs ranch. He denied any connection with Joseph Sibley politically or in business.

On cross-examination the witness said he resigned his position of secretary of the interior in 1898. He said he secured the action of congress on appropriations for the World's fair in 1904. The witness told of his efforts to get money and was very sorry that almost the entire Texas delegation was opposed to the appropriations. He said they did not vote for the appropriations, which he regretted very much at the time.

At times during ex-Governor Francis' testimony there were dramatic scenes. Mr. Cooke was cross-examining Mr. Francis, stated that there had been some question regarding the World's fair accounts, when from inside he would take measures to protect himself. Chairman O'Neal reproved Mr. Cooke for his question and insisted that the witness be treated with the proper respect.

Fatal Run Over.

Grand Saline, Tex., Feb. 12.—T. B. Rainey of New Boston, Tex., visiting relatives here, while crossing the tracks in the Texas and Pacific yards opposite the Lone Star Salt company's plant, was struck by an engine and died in a few minutes. He was fifty-nine years old.
