Now that Wall street or the
stock market has apparently
stopped bucking, or at least tem-
porarily over its rampage, the
President has made his long longed
for announcement with reference
to the situation, and this announce-
ment is to the effect that he has
nothing now to announce. In a
letter to Mr. Smith, President of
the Illinois Business Association,
he declined to make a speech at
Springfield, mainly for the reason
that he had nothing new to say,
but enclosed marked copies of
speeches made in October and No-
vember, 1905, with his last mes-
sages to Congress also marked
paragraphs it may be well to quote.

"I do not believe in Government
ownership of anything which can
with propriety be left in private
hands, and I strenuously object to
private ownership of railroads."
"Government supervision is
needed."
"I am convinced that there must
be an increased regulatory and su-
pervisory power exercised by the
Government over the railroads."
"I am in no sense hostile to cor-
poration. The corporation has
come to stay, just as the trade uni-
on has come to stay. Each should
be sharply checked when it acts
against law and justice."

Letter to R. T. Hazard

Jefferson, Texas.
Dear Sir: If we sell Devoe to paint
your roof, you will not have so
much freight to haul.
It takes 10 gallons to paint a fair-size
house, and that house won't want
again for 5 or 10 years. That's true

year, paint?

SUSPENSION QUESTION.

Speaker Holds Four-Fifths Pre- cent is Ample.

Austin, April 8.—A spirited debate
occurred in the house over the ques-
tion of suspending a constitutional
rule. The proposition came up on the
motion to pass finally, under suspen-
sion of the rules, the bill amending the
county depository law. The chair held
that four-fifths of the members present
were sufficient to suspend the rule,
and that the bill having received 90 to
1 for suspension, that the rule was so
cordingly suspended. This was at once
objected to by some members, who
contended that it takes four-fifths of
the entire membership of the house to
suspend the rule and not four-fifths of
those present. Representative Means
contended that the ruling of the
speaker was incorrect.

Speaker Love took the floor and said
that it was only Saturday he investi-
gated the matter and was sure he was
right and that the attorney general
had no objection.

Mr. Brown of Wharton said that if
this ruling prevails it will result in
much injurious legislation being rail-
roaded through during the remainder
of the session. He appealed from the
decision of the chair, and while dis-
cussing this appeal the house recessed
until afternoon.

The general appropriation bill was
passed finally in the house in two mi-
nutes without any further debate or
amendment.

An act was passed amending the
county depository law making it man-
datory on county commissioners to ad-
vertise for bids to deposit county
funds.

To county supervision bill by Mr.
Alderice, providing for county school
superintendents in all counties having
2,000 scholars, passed finally.

Representatives Reeves and McKen-
zie introduced a resolution in the
house that the remaining days of the
session being suspension days and day
of "floor reports," that members are
able to get the malady known as
"brain storm," therefore be it re-
solved, that "God save the state." The
resolution was referred to the com-
mittee on public health.

The house passed the Dallas charter
bill and sent it over to the senate.
The latter concurred in the house
amendments. Among the amendments
is the "fiscal" proposition.

In the senate Robertson's insurance
bill, which requires insurance compa-
nies to deposit 75 per cent of the re-
serve fund on Texas business to be
invested in Texas securities, was passed
finally—30 to 5.

The senate also passed the house
bill requiring railroads to report to the
commissioner all rolling stock they have
on hand and passed finally house bill
providing for state tax board to calcu-
late ad valorem tax on income.

It also passed finally house bill im-
posing a tax of \$1,000 on retail dealers
in intoxicating liquors in local option
districts. The passage of this measure
will effectively knock out the "I Know"
and "You Know" which operate usu-
ally in prohibition districts.

SPEAKER SUSTAINED.

Majority of Members Uphold
Ruling Made.
Austin, April 9.—The houses sus-
tained the ruling of Speaker Love that
four-fifths of the members present can
pass any measure.

The house adopted the amendment
appropriating \$20,000 for an agricultural
department.

In the senate the anti-bucket shop
bill passed.

The election bill and a measure look-
ing to a reform of judicial procedure
justified each other for precedence in
the senate with the result that both,
although "platform demands," were
shortly added in favor of the "regular
order," which happened to be a bill
requiring railroads to show how many
of the cars used by them are leased
and rented. After that it disposed
of the "automatic" tax bill, passing it,
finally, but with such amendments as
will probably require that it be sent
to a conference committee.

The senate passed the Robertson in-
surance bill, after materially amend-
ing it, with five negative votes. Fire
and marine companies are exempt. It
was sent to conference.

A notable change is that, instead of
having to deposit investment securi-
ties in the state treasury, as was pro-
vided by the house bill, they may be
kept in any bank, state or national,
that is, a state or national depository.

FRUIT FAILURE.

Hon. George B. Terrell Says Prospects
Are Rather Gloomy.
Austin, April 8.—Hon. George B.
Terrell returned from his home at Alto
and reports that the fruit crop is a
failure. He says that there is not 2
per cent of a crop in his orchard, and
Wesley Love of Jacksonville, the larg-
est peach grower in the state, says
that there is not more than 5 per cent
of a crop around Jacksonville, which
is the largest shipping point in the
state. Mr. Terrell attributes this failure
to the warm weather in January,
which caused the sap to rise and the
buds to swell, so much so that they
were killed by the cold weather that
followed.


Child Drank Kerosene.
