NAVIGATION OF RED RIVER.

New Orleans, La., July 26.—Congressman Morris Sheppard of the First Texas District is in the city on a very interesting and important mission. Today he met the officers and members of the Board of Trade, Cotton Exchange, Progressive Union and other citizens in regard to the opening up of Red river for continuous navigation from New Orleans to the mouth of the Washita. Boats now go as far as Shreveport, while Denison is the theoretical head of navigation.

It is planned to organize the whole Red River Valley for a meeting to be held in Shreveport in the fall.—Dallas News.

If energy, push and perseverance counts for anything, Congressman Sheppard will surely win out in the question of navigation. He leaves nothing undone. When and wherever he can get in his work, he never fails to do what he can. His effort to have a great convention at Shreveport in the coming fall of the entire Red river valley, is what should have been done years ago. No one questions but what he will succeed in getting together from New Orleans to Denison those interested in the question of navigation. Every city, town, every section of the country tributary to Red river for 100 miles on either side between New Orleans and Denison should have a representative at the convention. The question of water transportation is one every one should understand, for all are directly interested in it. Why the great commercial interest of New Orleans should have permitted the navigation of the Red river to get in its present condition, letting the trade of so rich a section drift away from them, is beyond understanding. It is much easier to keep a trade than it is to get it back when once it is permitted to go elsewhere.

If our Texas Legislature and Governor had the backbone to pass a bill that has just gone through the Legislature in Georgia, and the Governor had pledged himself to sign, there would be State prohibition in Texas as well as Georgia. The bill is styled "the Hardman-Covington prohibition bill" and prohibits the manufacture or keeping on hand in any place of business or giving away to induce business within the State of any liquor that may produce intoxication. An amendment to the bill permits the sale of pure alcohol by retail druggists on the prescription of a reputable physician.

Remember Marion county want all her roads graded and put in the best of condition. Use the slag of the furnace, the county will then have roads which will attract great attention. A traction engine, with a drop bottom car can do the work cheaply. It can deliver 20 tons at a load, possibly more. This will enable the farmer to haul four instead of two bales of cotton to market. Investigate all this before you vote on the amendments, and then vote accordingly.
