BLOWN INTO BITS.

Boiler Explodes, Kills Two Men and Wrecks Mill. Votaw, Tex., Oct. 15.—Hardin county has had a terrible mishap. The boiler in the Davis mill, twelve miles from here, exploded, killing George Davis, son of the owner of the mill, and George Moore, a brother-in-law. They were torn into bits. There were several others hurt. Saturday news reached here that a young man named Wiggins was expected to die. It seems they had started a fire in the furnace when they discovered there was no water in the boiler. Young Davis was putting water when it burst. The mill was wrecked.

CONSPIRACY CHARGED.

Mother and Two Daughters Have Been Indicted at San Antonio. San Antonio, Oct. 15.—The grand jury returned indictments for blackmail growing out of a charge of rape recently made against Dr. Frederick J. Fielding. The indictments are against Mrs. Elizabeth Mueller, Nettie Stetbach and Quincey Stetbach, the first named being the mother of the two last named, and the charge is conspiracy to extort money. A few days ago Mrs. Mueller made affidavit charging Dr. Fielding with criminally assaulting her daughter, Nettie. No bill was found against Fielding. The mother and daughters were arrested.

TO HAVE CREAMERY.

It Will Be One of the Most Extensive in the State. Gainesville, Tex., Oct. 15.—A creamery, said to be one of the largest in Texas, will soon be in operation here, projected by local capital. About \$50,000 worth of machinery has been ordered and the plant will be running in a few weeks. It is estimated that \$10,000 a year is received by Cooke county farmers for cream shipped to other towns, and this had a great influence in causing the creamery to be built here.

SHOT SIX TIMES.

Jake Sallinas, a Mexican Shoemaker, Murdered by Unknown Assassin. Bay City, Tex., Oct. 15.—Jake Sallinas, a Mexican shoemaker at this place, was murdered about one mile west of town by unknown parties. The news was brought to town by the Southern Pacific conductor, who saw him lying dead by the track as his train passed. He was shot four times in the back and once in the leg and arm, and also there was a large hole in the right side of his head where he had been struck.

WONDERFUL SMOKE.

Had on His Head Picture That Resembled a Woman. Hillsboro, Tex., Oct. 15.—William Hillsboro, Tex., Oct. 15.—William Hilliard, living near Malone, caught a small spotted snake somewhat resembling a rattler, which had on the back of its head a perfect picture of a human head, face, neck and shoulders, the face and other parts mostly resembling those of a woman. The reptile is preserved in a physician's office at Malone.

STRUCK BY BASEBALL.

William Leonard's Wife Hit and He Has Injured Suit. Sherman, Tex., Oct. 15.—In the Fifteenth district court William Leonard entered suit for damages in the sum of \$10,000 against Oscar Stoenner, alleging that the plaintiff's wife was struck by a baseball thrown in a street at Denison, contrary to law, and that she sustained painful and permanent injuries therefrom.

Preparing Blank Form.

Austin, Oct. 15.—The state insurance department is already preparing the blank forms which are to be sent to the various insurance companies doing business in Texas upon which to make their report for 1908. Chief Clerk Thwait of the department says that these blank forms will differ in some respects from those of former years on account of some changes.

Much Silver Overlooked.

Houston, Oct. 15.—B. F. Bonner, general manager of the Kirby Lumber company, announces the receipt of official information from T. H. Hunter that \$5,150 in silver dollars was found at Atalaba and \$1,740 in silver dollars in bags was overlooked.

Stabbed in Lungs.

Texas, Oct. 15.—A message received here from Laredo fifteen miles west of here, states that in an altercation there Dr. George Smith, a prominent physician of that locality, was stabbed through the lungs by a young man. Dr. Smith the message said, is in a very critical condition. No arrests have been made.

Tanks For Oil.

Laredo, Tex., Oct. 15.—Eight big oil tanks have just been completed at the Mexican National shops in Laredo to be used in transporting oil from the Piedras plant oil wells in Durval county.

Work Begins on Road.

Fort Worth, Oct. 15.—Monday morning half a hundred men on the Turner Interurban began throwing dirt in the vicinity of Lake Como, working toward Mineral Wells, via Weatherford.

Young Lady Shot in Foot.

Fort Worth, Oct. 15.—By the accidental discharge of a pistol Miss Julia Bannum of Ennis was shot in her left foot.

Submission Date Set.

Waters-Pierce Receivership to Be Heard Oct. 21. Austin, Oct. 11.—The court of civil appeals for the Third district has granted the motion of the state for an advance of the Waters-Pierce Oil company receivership case and it was set for submission on Oct. 21. The oil company wanted the ouster and receivership case consolidated.

The hearing before the railroad commission regarding the commission's recent order applying short line passenger rates between points in the state was brought to an abrupt termination shortly after the hearing began by Commissioner Mayfield announcing that the question would be postponed until the November hearing. General passenger agents were here in large numbers to protest against the proposed order and to endeavor to demonstrate to the commission that it was unjust. General Passenger Agent Anderson of the Sunset-Central began his argument by citing rates from El Paso to Fort Worth, and that under the proposed order the rate from El Paso to Fort Worth would be the same on his line and the Texas and Pacific, although the Katy gets a division of the rate, it being the connecting line between San Antonio and Fort Worth. Vernon Beggs, secretary of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, has filed an application with the railroad commission for a hearing on the question of the physical condition of the Fort Worth and Denver railroad, which he claims is bad.

DORCHESTER SEES PIERCE

Later Says He Will Visit Texas at the Proper Time. Sherman, Tex., Oct. 12.—D. Dorchester, Federal receiver of the Waters-Pierce Oil company in Texas, who has been in St. Louis for several days, has returned home.

While there Mr. Dorchester met Henry Clay Pierce. He expressed to the receiver satisfaction at the progress of the business under court direction, and his belief that he will be dealt with justly thereby.

He did not refer to the oft repeated determination of Governor Campbell to have him back in Texas, but stated to Mr. Dorchester his intentions to, at a proper time, visit the state, and does not seem to find in the situation any cause for alarm for his personal or property interests.
