Less Drunks Under Prohibition.

Below we quote from the official statement of Atlanta, Ga., made by Judge W. H. Preston, Recorder pro tem. This report can be relied on as correct as it is official.

Number of arrests drunk in Atlanta, Ga., last year of open saloons, 1907, was 6508. Last year with no saloons, 1908, was 2650.

From January 1st to October 1st 1910, was 1120.

The above decrease in drunks made under prohibition while the population of Atlanta has increased 20,000 or more.

Liquor Forced In.

Liquor advocates would have us believe that a more persistent and extensive violation of liquor prohibitory laws than of any others is inevitable and natural—that "public sentiment" will not support their enforcement—that it is a characteristic of liquor that all who drink it at all form such an intense craving for intoxicants that they just will have them law or no law, and that those who have never drunk will be more strongly tempted to do so when it is outlawed and driven into dens and dives.

The truth is that liquor is not drawn into prohibition territory for unlawful sale by the thirst of the people for it, but it is forced in by the liquor man's thirst for the money it brings. All the power, cunning and persistence of the organized traffic is used to introduce it, not so much for the immediate purpose of maintaining or increasing consumption as to discredit the law so as to bring about its repeal and to manufacture evidence that it will not prohibit, for use in other localities where prohibition is proposed. It opposes with all its weapons of deceit, corruption, fraud, slander, intimidation and boycott the adoption of prohibition wherever proposed whether in precinct, county or state. If it stopped there the case against it would not be so bad, but should it fall of its success at the polls, it does not accept the result, but at once joins the criminal element in that territory and backs it to the full extent of its power and influence in defying the law. If manufacturers and dealers outside, were to withdraw their support from criminal dealers in prohibition territory, dissolve partnership with crime, and favor the enforcement of the law, all of which it is their duty to do, who is so ignorant as not to know that this would mean the due enforcement of the law and the virtual end of unlawful selling in such territory? But they know they cannot afford it. They would be thus left naked to their enemies. The very moment they permit such an object to exist long enough to become generally known, prohibition would spread like a prairie fire and their nefarious business would be doomed to swift and utter extinction throughout the nation.

Shall this scourge of mankind be permitted to successfully defend itself by pleading its own lawlessness? It is a wise and wholesome maxim of our law that no one shall be allowed to take advantage of his own wrong. Yet this is precisely what these liquor people claim the right to do. And the more they strengthen their claim to it, the more they strengthen the power of the law in which interests and it should be that power is under that liquor cause for are so peculiarly prohibitory of enforcement, and early difficulties they are not insurmountable. If the laws of the land are to be respected and their villainy repaid or defeated such reason for widening prohibition territory as rapidly as possible until we have achieved the moral and complete extinction of the traffic? We cannot hope to have an ideal enforcement of the law until the business is storn of its strength by nation-wide prohibition, but it will be less and less difficult as prohibition territory is extended. Who is so foolish as to expect to despatch so huge, calloused and venomous a serpent by one stroke? It will require time and upon blow, never cease as there is a wiggle in the tail. We will then bring the reptile across a thorough line of prosperity throughout the land.
