Beeville, Dec. 20.—J. F. Perkins, of Driscoll, went after his steer in a hurry and landed his lariat safely around the animal's horns the first throw. The tying act was not very quick, but the action was completed in 53 seconds, and the contestant was greeted with a great cheer from the throng of spectators.

W. P. Rutledge, of Kennedy, made the winning time of 54 seconds, although he had to throw his steer to the ground twice. The animal was small and wiry and hard to handle.

Sam Dickens, of Beeville, the young man who made the best time at the San Antonio fair contest last fall, was seventh man. He failed to catch his steer until the fifth throw. His time was 2:23.

Riley Smith, of Beeville, one of the winners at the San Antonio contest last fall, was fourteenth man. He caught the third throw, brought his steer down instantly, and had the time of 1:32 marked opposite his name.

On Monday night the school committee met at the court house and elected Dr. J. A. Maren chairman and C. A. Dailey secretary. Several sub-committees were appointed, the more important ones being one on the laws relative to schools, composed of Hon. J. W. Hill, Dr. Boyd Cornick and Brown F. Lee. The committee to investigate school district consisted of Chas. A. Dailey, W. S. Cunningham, F. O. Perry, A. D. West.

At the previous meeting mention was not made that Austin Spencer offered in behalf of the people living in the Spencer Addition with the old scouring mill as a center, to build a ward school house if the school trustees would furnish the teachers, which simply demonstrates the fact that the people want something done. After considerable friendly discussion the committee adjourned to meet Monday night, June 6th, 1902.
