HITS 'EM HARD

Blatant Ignorance of an Outside Concern About Texas Conditions Properly Rebuked.

W. G. Ray, who was for many years a well known traveling man, but who has recently decided to enter the commission business in San Angelo, received a letter from a Memphis, Tenn., scheme goods concern, a few days ago, in which the following language was used:

"Beg to say that we are pulling out of Texas for the present, as we consign our goods, putting out our own money, and Texas is beginning to get pretty shy of cash."

In reply Mr. Ray, who is nothing if not patriotic and a firm believer in Texas, past, present and future, handed out the following warm "bunch of buns":

Gentlemen: "The tenor of your communication of the 29th is astonishing to me, and would be equally so to any other man of ordinary business sense, who possesses any acquaintance whatever with business conditions in Texas—a knowledge which your letter shows very plainly that you do not possess."

"Texas is beginning to get pretty shy of cash," you say, when as a matter of fact there is more money in Texas today than at any previous time in her history. If you will take a look at cotton statistics, at live stock statistics, and will take the trouble to post yourselves, even superficially, upon the general conditions in Texas, you will discover some things which may perhaps remove the scales of a

Hanna and Whitney.

There was a certain parallelism in the lives of the two great political leaders who died last month. Senator Hanna and ex-Secretary Whitney had both won remarkable success and reputation in other fields of effort before they thought of devoting themselves to politics in the large. Each became a force in national politics, not in his own personal interest, but in that of a friend to whom he pledged his undivided support. Mr. Hanna's devotion to McKinley in the campaigns of 1896 and 1900 was hardly less marked than that of Mr. Whitney. Although Mr. Whitney was the younger man, he completed his active political career just as Mr. Hanna was entering on his—eight years ago. Both men had unusual executive ability; they were adepts in political management. Senator Hanna could have been a great cabinet officer, as Mr. Whitney could have been an eminent parliamentarian. In the organization of great industrial undertakings, neither man had many equals. As Secretary of the Navy in President Cleveland's first cabinet, Mr. Whitney laid the foundations that made possible the victories at Santiago and Manila a decade later. In later years, he showed rare capacity in the consolidation of transportation interests of New York—the same kind of capacity that Mr. Hanna had shown in Cleveland—Review of Reviews.
