Conditions in West Texas.

Reports from the various counties in West Texas indicate a condition of range which is truly a cause for congratulations for stockmen. Ranches which have suffered from the lack of grass throughout the summer months now promise good range for cattle and sheep. Grass for winter feed is practically assured and weeds for sheep will be plentiful. Ranchmen are feeling good over the outlook. They will not have so much feeding to do and their stock will fare better. These conditions added to the looking up of prices for beef are making West Texas feel better.

San Angelo, West Texas' trade center metropolitan and cosmopolitan, is assured a prosperous fall and winter season. Ranchmen who felt, up to the time the rains came, that they could not afford to go to the World's Fair are coming in and taking their families to St. Louis with them. But a few of them have gone so far but there are many more to follow. This is an indication of what effect the rains have had. Nor is it an overestimation. The ranchman is not one to overestimate. He is a cool hand at calculations. If he could not see his way clear to take a pleasure jaunt, after he had decided the outlook was too poor to admit of such, he would not do it. The ranchman is feeling good.

San Angelo's carnival is the attraction next in the minds of West Texans. The carnival this year promises to be bigger and better than ever. The Press looks for a larger number of visitors this year than on former occasions. The people of all Texas, and many people in other states, have their eyes turned San Angeloward. There is no bell weevil in this section to work the farmer injury. There is plenty of good farming land. There is room for thousands of the smaller stock-farmers. For these reasons people in the pest-ridden districts are thinking of the golden West. And on the occasion of the carnival they are coming here as they never came before. They will

come to see what West Texas is, what is produced here and to try to see what the future has in store for this section.

It behooves the people of San Angelo and of all West Texas to show them. The different counties could profit by county exhibits. Each farmer in this section can enhance the value of his property by showing those things which he raises, at the carnival. The Press is committed to this plan of Agricultural Exhibits for counties. Coke county has promised to be here. Schleicher is talking about it. There is room for Sterling, Runnels, Concho, Menard, Sutton, Crockett, Reagan and others if they will come.

The carnival is an assured success. The visitors will be here. Let the people of West Texas see that this section's resources are properly displayed. The land agents will do the rest.
