Election Notes.

It is now Constable Otto Muscke. The election in Shiner was very quiet.

Robson carried Fayette county by 235 votes.

Benne has carried the county by a heavy majority.

The Shiner box gave Robson 170 more votes than Hawley.

The congressional vote this year is 2689 votes less than in 1896.

Lavaca County will go for Robson by a majority of 277 votes.

There were many surprises in store for the defeated candidates.

Robson's majority over Hawley at the Coakum box was 124 votes.

Colorado county surprised the native by giving Robson a majority of 79.

John Blohm was elected justice of the peace by a good, safe majority.

Emi Rhuemann made a hard fight, and the Shiner box gave him a big vote.

Rough Rider Roosevelt has been elected Governor of New York by a good majority.

The Fifth district returns Joe Bailey to congress by a majority of nearly 4,000.

Was Jones was snowed under in the fifth district, by upwards of 10,000 votes.

Paulus, Blakeslee, Lay, Buchanan and Bennett are the wheel-horses of the county democracy.

A word to the defeated candidates: "Don't enumerate your poultry at a period anterior to their incubation."

Robson and Hawley ran neck and neck on the mainland in Galveston county, but the city gave Hawley 900 majority.

County Assessor Pesek wore the most taking smile, and gave the most cordial greeting of any candidate in the field, and this contributed largely to his success.

Ex-Congressman Walter Gresham will wear that hat at the expense of Governor elect Joe Sayers, for Robson did not get to the bridge with that 500 majority.

Gary, the colored republican candidate for congress, received 107 votes in Galveston, and 232 in the entire district. Mr. Gary was evidently slaughtered in the house of his friends.

THE TROUBLE IN NORTH CAROLINA.

The threatened election riots in Wilmington, North Carolina, did not break out until the 10th, two days after election, but they are all the more fierce for being delayed.

Sixteen negroes were killed, and many wounded. The negro mayor and board of aldermen were compelled to resign, and removed from office, and a newspaper plant belonging to a colored editor was burned and destroyed. The white men have taken control of the city government, appointed a new mayor and aldermen, and police force, and quiet once more reigns in the city. The militia are assisting the police in keeping order, and there is no further danger to the negroes unless they provoke trouble.
