There were five or six heavyweights in the Moulton nine, who knocked the ball clean "out of sight" and repeatedly scored home runs. The ball landed twice close to Trantwein and Wolters' gin, and once in Loessin's peach orchard, which was enclosed by a high wire fence. The heavy hitters were Maresh, Dockery, Jackson, Burke and Seckamp. After the third inning the game was a walkover for Moulton. The Shiner boys were clearly outclassed, but knowing the men they had to deal with, they risked the game, and of course, have no kick coming.

The Shiner boys were expert throwers and catchers, but when it came to batting they were too light, and a number of them were put out on first base. Although at a great disadvantage, the Shiner boys kept a stiff upper lip and played the game to a finish. The score at the close of the game standing 52 to 10 in favor of Moulton. There was only one wrangle to mar the good feeling that existed between the boys and Shiner took its defeat good naturedly throughout. There was a large crowd present to witness the game, fully one-half of them being from Moulton.
