Of Moulton Endorsed for County Superintendent

For the first time in its history Moulton presents a candidate for a county office to the people of Lavaca county. Our candidate aspires to one of the most important as well as most responsible offices in our county. He commenced his professional career at Kinkler in this county. He opened the school at that place with 38 children. After teaching there two years, the school house got too small, a new one had to be built and an assistant was given him. When he resigned after teaching there six years, he had 80 children. During the past session he was principal of the Sam and Will Moore Institute, a school of ten grades. He conducted the school to the entire satisfaction of the trustees and patrons of the school and not a single complaint was registered against him. His students were exceptionally studious and well behaved, and made good progress. The record in attendance of the girl students in his room cannot be surpassed, and we doubt if it can be equalled anywhere in the State. Of the eight girls enrolled in the high school, only one missed one day during the eight month's session. His teachers were loyal and worked in perfect harmony with him. The above results were due to the good judgment, tact, discretion and executive ability (coupled with a sympathetic nature) which he displayed in the management of the school. He is in every way equipped to make an efficient successor to our present incumbent of the superintendent's office.
