

### In Memoriam.

Through a tribute of love to the memory of my dear friend, Mrs. Patsy Key, more familiarly known as Grandma Key, I pen this sketch of her life.

Died, at the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Rue Thornton, at Nickel, Gonzales county, Texas, March 1911, at 7 o'clock p. m., Mrs. Martha Key.

Had she lived until June 30th she would have attained the ripe age of 93 years. Born in Tennessee June 30th 1819, married to Mr. Reuben Key 1835. Came to Texas and settled near Moulton, where they resided for 60 years. She professed faith in Christ in her 19th year and joined the Primitive Baptist church, where she lived a consistent member, always attending when able to go, until extreme age kept her at home, but never failed to read her bible as long as she could see how.

Her christian faith strengthened and brightened in her declining years, which were quiet and happy, making her life a beautiful example. She possessed those rare graces of heart and mind that endeared her to all who knew her. Always ready to speak a kind word and lend a helping hand to the needy, loving and affectionate to her family, a true, good friend. She often said she was passing away, still death had no terror, no sting, often repeating these lines:

"The day is past and gone, the evening shades appear,  
O, may we all remember well the night of death draws near."

At her bedside when the end came were two daughters and close friends. She suffered no pain, but the weight of ninety-two years had exhausted all the powers of her nature. The silver cord was loosed, the golden bowl was broken. Almost without a struggle her soul fled to that beautiful home above.

Her husband, Mr. Reuben Key, was born March 18th 1816, died Aug. 27th 1873. Until them were born ten children, John Key of Burnett, Texas, now deceased; Mesdames Rachel Bunting and Susan Wood of Moulton; James Key, killed in Confederate War; Mrs. Ambeze Crain of Sabinal, Texas; Orin Key of Clairmont, Kent county, Texas; Mrs. Louisa Kuykendall of N. M., also Mrs. Nannie Kuykendall of Merton, Irion county, Texas; Mrs. Sallie Thornton of Nickel, Texas, where she made her home the last several years of her life. The devotion of this daughter to her aged mother was characterized by her untiring duties in the home which was the center of mother's purest enjoyment, adding to her every comfort, making mother's last days sweet and happy. What sphere more noble, more holy, for true womanhood than this?

Her descendants profit by her wise counsel and long experience of the battles of this life. Her body was laid to rest next day at 4 p. m., in Bunting cemetery beside her husband, in the presence of a number of relatives and friends, Rev. Dobs in an impressive sermon, officiating. The sweet memory of grandma's sacred life remains to her children and loved ones to emulate her christian virtues and follow her example, which will inspire and lead them in the shining path to heaven.

Asleep in Jesus, blessed sleep. She leaves many sorrowing children, grand children and great grand children and a host of friends to mourn her absence. How glorious will the greetings be when we meet to part no more. May God in his mercy guide you through life that in the end they will all meet in our Father's home in heaven. We deeply sympathize with them.
