COMMON SENSE.

Bishop Joice of the Methodist church wants to establish a chair of common sense in the theological seminaries of that denomination.

Common sense is not to be learned at the theological or any other kind of learned institutions. It is inherent in the makeup of a man, or he catches it from the rough points that he has to rub off as he encounters the vicissitudes of life. Preachers are about as liberally endowed with common sense as men of other professions.

A FRAUD.

One of the greatest of frauds is the alleged teachers' employment bureau. A certain fee is exacted from the teacher applicant, in order that his or her name may be placed upon the list of eligibles, and there the transaction ends. Teachers and would-be-teachers should know from experience and local conditions that as a rule there are a dozen or more applicants for every vacancy. One of the latest of these frauds

is a Chicago firm now advertising in Texas papers.

"I've often noticed," observed the veteran of the northwestern mining camps, thoughtfully, "that no matter how ignorant or lacking brains or judgment a man may be, there is one thing that is certain he can do far better than the men who make a business of it. That is running a newspaper. Its the same in every community. Take the average man on the street here in New York, pin him in a corner, insist on his honest, candid opinion, and he will modestly tell you a dozen points about the papers which he could improve. It was the same way in Deep Gulch, and I don't doubt the same conditions exist in every city and village between the two places. But my observation leads me to think that a man needs a mighty lot of judgment to run a paper right, and that there is just as much chance for use of this same judgment in knowing what to keep out of a paper as what to print.—Exchange.
