### RUSK COUNTY LOCAL OPTION

Compromise Agreement Entered in Civil Appeals Court.

Galveston, Texas, November 13.—The Shadden et al vs. Moore et al, the Rusk county prohibition contest case, on appeal in the court of civil appeals, has been compromised. The agreement is that appellants, the antis, dismiss their appeal and that Rusk county remains wet until January 1, 1904.

The pros have heretofore been restrained by injunction from enforcing the judgment of the court below until the appeal is disposed of. By taking the time limit in filing motion, etc., the appellants could have postponed final judgment to a later date than the one agreed on.

### ANOTHER DEATH AT SAN ANTONIO

Official Court Stenographer Vance Expired at the Hospital.

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 13.—No new cases were reported today.

Joe P. Vance, the official court stenographer, died this morning at the city hospital. The experts claim death was from yellow fever, and City Bacteriologist Campbell says it was malaria fever.

#### The Laredo Report.

Laredo, Tex., Nov. 13.—There were twenty-four new cases and no deaths yesterday. There were sixteen cases and four deaths today.

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 13.—There were two deaths from yellow fever in San Antonio today. One was Joseph P. Vance and the other Agadete Robley. The Vance case was reported several days ago, but the Robley case was not discovered until today. The man died before medical attention reached him. He has been sick for some time, but no physician was in attendance during sickness.

There are now three cases under treatment, and two of them are about well. A new plan was agreed on today, by which the city is to be re-inspected and re-cleaned and health officers from all over the State are invited to come to San Antonio and see conditions for themselves. Those health officers will be furnished transportation free, and it is believed when they have seen the situation they will advise the lifting of San Antonio's quarantine.

### "The Valley."

The Valley Magazine, the property of William Marion Reedy of St. Louis, has changed ownership, and the November number, just from the press, is issued under the new management, and the name changed to "The Valley." Mr. Reedy had already made a good magazine out of The Valley, but the new owners, the Mead-Beggars Co., have enlarged it and otherwise improved it. It is a typical magazine of the great Middle West, and the November issue is full of bright stories, beautiful pictures and a splendid collection of feature pages. The Valley bids fair to become a great magazine, and should be encouraged in this section where we have too few such publications to reflect the sentiment of Southern people.

### Young Men's Sunday.

Tomorrow the R. R. Y. M. C. A. will have what is generally called a Young Men's Sunday. Prominent Association men in the State will be here and will speak at the various churches.

Tomorrow afternoon at 2:45 Mr. S. A. Kincaid, general secretary of the Houston Association, will address the boys. At 4 o'clock Judge J. E. Boynton of Waco will deliver his great address on the subject, "The Trial of St. Paul," from the standpoint of a lawyer.

The boys' and men's meeting will be held in the Association building.

Addresses will be given in the following churches at night: Baptist, Congregational and Christian. The Methodists and Presbyterians will meet with the Baptists.

### HANNA CALLS HIS PARTY WORKERS

National Republican Committee to Meet December 11.

Washington, November 13.—Senator Hanna, chairman of the republican national committee, today mailed each member of the committee a letter calling them to meet at the Arlington hotel, in Washington, Friday, December 11.

The call was also signed by Perry S. Heath, secretary.

The committee will meet Friday, appoint a sub-committee, and Saturday morning will hear the claims of cities aspiring to be selected as the place for holding the 1904 convention.

Senator Hanna will entertain the members of the committee at dinner at the Arlington hotel Saturday night, December 12.

### PRESSURE HAS BEEN PUT ON

Administration Has Consulted Congressmen.

Washington, Nov. 13.—At today's cabinet meeting practically the only subject under consideration was the Panama situation. The birth of the new republic, signalized by its accredited minister M. Philippe Bunea-Varilla, was announced by the president.

In that connection the whole Panama situation was discussed briefly, particular attention being devoted to prospective developments in congress. Both the president and members of the cabinet have taken up the matter with senators and representatives with a view to the reconciliation of any differences that may exist and to secure harmonious action, if possible on the canal question.

It can be stated authoritatively that the situation, as it now presents itself, is entirely satisfactory to the president and his advisers. Several days ago informal inquiry was made by the war department whether it would be necessary in any probable event to send troops to the isthmus. The reply was that none would be needed. In fact, officials of the administration deprecate even a suggestion of such action, as they state emphatically there is no foundation for it.
