THE REASON WHY.

Many say that this town is not receiving the cotton and seed which it did three years ago, as much of it goes to Frankston and some as far as Tyler to be marketed. It is impossible to find out why.—Palestine Correspondent to Houston Post.

In the HERALD's opinion it is an easy thing to know why in this instance. Perhaps the Houston Post correspondent does not know that the extreme northeastern portion of this country lies as close to Tyler as to Palestine, with the roads largely in favor of Tyler. Frankston, located in this county, is about centrally located between Tyler, Palestine, Jacksonville and Athens, and about thirty miles from either place. Again Tyler is making heroic organized effort to attract trade; Palestine is doing nothing along this line. This is the truth, and though truth sometimes hurts, it is better told if it acts for an incentive for better work. Tyler is a prohibition town, 'tis true, but that cuts no figure with the farmer, and it is an insult to him to say it does. The farmer carries his produce where he can get the best prices for it and where he can get the most courteous treatment. A few weeks ago every weekly newspaper published in a radius of fifty miles of Tyler carried from one-fourth to one-half a page from the Tyler Commercial Club, setting forth Tyler's advantages as a cotton market, enumerating free wagon yards, rest rooms, cash cotton buyers, cotton weighed free, ample cotton sheds, etc. But in these papers not a line from Palestine. Palestine's leading merchants, many of them, never advertise individually in their home papers.

The reason why, in reply to the Post correspondent, is that Palestine people have not waked up to the necessity of it, and having never sufficiently tried it, do not know what good results can be accomplished by united effort, and some direct advertising. But they will wake up to the necessity some day. Some of them may be forced into bankruptcy first, but they will realize that to keep at the head of the procession they must get together and hustle.

The boll weevil is not the only hard proposition that confronts Palestine. There are others.

That new schedule to go into effect Sunday morning is about the most awkward arrangement this town ever went up against. It threatens to prove a shut-out for the big morning dailies.

ABOUT the hardest proposition that now confronts Texas is the Terrell election law. The HERALD editor has been studying the law for the past month, and the deeper he gets into it the less he knows about it.
