## JUDGE GREGG ASKS FOR A NEW POSTOFFICE

Introduces A Bill Asking For \$75,000 Appropriation For a Postoffice Building In This City.

Judge A. W. Gregg, congressman from this district, has introduced in congress his first bill, and it asks for an appropriation of \$75,000 for a new postoffice building for Palestine.

There is no doubt but that Palestine needs the building, and needs it badly. The office is now cramped up in a store building, without sufficient room or light, and in a room in no wise fitted up for the purpose.

The business of the Palestine post-

office has grown enormously within the past few years, and the securing of free delivery a few years ago brought on an additional cramped condition. These carriers, and the various clerks work in close quarters.

Before leaving for Washington Congressman Gregg secured photos of Palestine's public buildings, as well as some of her private business buildings, and of the present postoffice, to more fully emphasize the necessity of a new postoffice building.

## BLOODY TRAGEDY AT SOUR LAKE BUGS DESTROYING TREES IN TYLER

Woman Shot Dead While at Table Eating Supper.

Sour Lake, Texas, Nov. 17.—Last night about 7 o'clock at the Rio Bravo, a boarding house, 1-2 miles south of town, a man who has been known as Fred Willis, is charged with shooting and killing his wife.

She was sitting with several others at the supper table and was shot through the window from the outside.

The bullet of a 45-calibre pistol passed through her head. Dr. M. M. Collins was called, but she was dying when he arrived, living about two hours after being shot.

The man charged with the murder had charge of the loading rack of the Rio Bravo Oil company, and was from Louisiana, and the murdered woman was from Kentucky. The body is held awaiting instructions from her relatives.

The cause of the shooting is declared the result of domestic difficulties.

Several weeks ago she made a complaint against him on account of threatening her life, and he was detained all night in the lock-up. The next day she appeared before the judge and plead for his release, which was granted.

The officers followed him to Nome and notified the officers of near-by towns to be on the lookout for him. He wore, when he left, a leather cap and blue jumper.

## QUARANTINE IS OFF ON SUNDAY

That Is the Date Fixed by Tabor and the Governor.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 17.—Health Officer Tabor returned from San Antonio last night and had a long consultation with the governor today.

An agreement was reached to raise the San Antonio quarantine on Sunday, November 22, provided no new cases of yellow fever developed in the meantime.

Dr. Tabor believes the trouble is over now, but prefers to await the developments of the next few days.

## TWO ACCIDENTS HORSES KILLED

Five Firemen Were Also Injured Down at Houston.

Houston, Tex., Nov. 11.—This afternoon a collision between a hook and ladder truck and trolley car at the corner of Preston avenue and Travis street, resulted in the death of a fire horse, and the injury of five firemen. None of the men were fatally hurt.

Another fire horse was killed later while responding to another alarm, by slipping and falling to the hard paving.

Peculiar Bugs Ravaging the Sycamores.—People Alarmed.

Tyler, Texas, Nov. 17.—During the last few days citizens of Tyler have discovered that there are millions of small bugs, about the size of an ordinary house fly, that are sapping the life out of sycamore trees. The bugs vary in size, many of them being as small as a gnat. When full grown they appear to have two fully developed wings, larger than the entire body of the bug. It is not known how long the bugs stay on the trees, nor how long they have been here. Neither is it known where they came from here. From all appearances the bug is a species of the boole weevil, being about the same size, though not the same color.

This morning the trees in the court yard were given a thorough drenching with the water and that night it rained. It was noticed that the water had no effect on them further than washing them from the trees.

The bugs attack the limbs and body of the trees and adhere so closely that it is difficult in some instances to remove them. The insects are on almost all sycamore trees in the city and are causing no little amount of alarm. Some seem to think that the trees will be killed outright and are spraying their trees, hoping to protect them from the supposed "sycamore tree killer."

## STATE TREASURY DEFICIT GROWS

The Belief Now Is That It Will Total About \$400,000.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 17.—The present deficit in the general revenue is increasing slowly and steadily, and in the opinion of knowing ones it will reach \$400,000 by the last of the present month.

The number registered yesterday was 119 and the amount \$15,744.58. The total number to date is 2923, and the total amount \$327,485.32.

The State treasurer received yesterday the sum of \$6622 interest due on land notes held by the permanent public free school fund.

## Quarantine Raised.

A special wire to the Postal this afternoon gives the information that State Health Officer Tabor has today raised the State quarantine against San Antonio. The cold weather of last night decided the issue.
