Bleibren walked out to Euclid Beach the other day while the wind was slashing off Lake Erie keen as a razor. Attired simply in bathing trunks, he walked barefooted to the lake and plunged in. Down he dived and up again floated, swam and then out upon the beach, only to dive again in the zero fluid.

He dived without taking a rub. There was never a quiver to show that he was cold from exposure. His flesh was firm, and the exercise and cold water had turned it pink.

He made a plunge and a swim in the lake about three times a week in winter, the swimmer said. "If I cannot swim through the ice I swim in the open water. I prefer the water. It's easier."

Radio-graphing Criminals.

Röntgen rays will soon be made use of by the Parisian police for the identification of criminals, says the London Telegraph. Some 16,000 photographic plates of cases of fractured bones, abnormal formations, etc., have already been collected, chiefly from the hospitals. Of course all these do not represent portions of the internal anatomy of criminal persons. But the Paris police go on the principle that people who have not yet broken the law may do so some day. These plates are accordingly being classified after the method invented by M. Bertillon for identification by finger marks and measurements of the body. It is proposed that in future all convicted persons shall be radiographed as they are now "anthropometrized."
