PALESTINE should be laying her plans now for next fall's carnival. Don't let politics swallow up this enterprise.

WITH cotton prices high and war in the East, the Texas mule is a valuable asset. In demand at home and abroad he is worth big money.

If we estimate the relative strength of the navies upon the basis of the total number of battleships, armored cruisers and scouts—that is to say, all warships above 1,000 tons displacement—that are actually completed, we find that Great Britain comes first with a total of 201 ships completed, of 1,516,000 tons displacement; France second, with 96 ships, of 576,000 tons displacement; Germany third, with 73 ships, of 388,000 tons displacement; Russia fourth, with 43 ships, of 315,000 tons displacement; United States fifth, with

35 ships, of 295,000 tons displacement; Italy sixth, with 38 ships, of 259,000 tons displacement, and Japan seventh, with 31 ships, of 206,000 tons displacement. All of these navies, however, have a large building program in hand, and taking them in their order, the names of the countries and the total tonnage of ships under construction, are as follows: Great Britain, 351,000 tons; United States, 322,000 tons; France, 180,000 tons; Russia, 139,000 tons; Germany, 118,000 tons; Italy, 70,000 tons, and Japan, 10,000 tons.—Scientific American.

It comes by way of Chicago that Colonel William Jennings Bryan is backing William Randolph Hearst for the presidency. The Times Herald is an independent newspaper and hence has a right to ask: Why shouldn't Mr. Bryan support Hearst for the presidency? Hearst went to the rescue of Bryan, with papers and funds, when Bryan's fortunes were at a low ebb. With the consolidated wealth of the country and all the great newspapers against Bryan, this young man from California cast his fortunes with a man already defeated and head of a forlorn hope. Colonel Bryan has made many mistakes; he has represented unpopular policies in the past and he is talking them today, but surely a man makes no mistake who chooses to return good for good and rewards loyalty when the opportunity comes. Ingratitude is said to be the basest of crimes. It is also a very common crime. Colonel Bryan would be an ingrate should he turn his back on the only great publisher he had in 1896 and again in 1900. It may be all right to forget the services of a newspaper or its publisher. Most politicians and most men do. It is really refreshing to find an individual who breaks away from long established usages and customs and recalls with gratitude the sacrifices of a friend and supporter.—Dallas Times Herald.

U. M. C. Squad Team

A large crowd witnessed the exhibition shoot by the U. M. C. Squad Team on the gun club grounds of this city yesterday. The team broke the world's record for a squad of five men, breaking 488 out of a possible 500, scoring the last 125 straight. The 100 targets were shot in four strings of twenty-five each, and the last string was made without a skip.

Following is the score: W. H. Heer, of Concordia, Kansas, 100; R. O. Heikes, Dayton, Ohio, 99; C. W. Bodd, Des Moines, Iowa, 98; T. E. Hubby, Waco, Texas, 97; Tom A. Marshall, 94. Captain Marshall was a little off in his shooting, owing to his hard work and loss of sleep.

The Squad were royally entertained by the Palestine sportsmen, and are delighted with their visit to this city. Several of the shooters are well known to the local sports, especially Mr. Hubby of Waco. He participated in the three days' shoot held here last year.

The team left for Bryan today, and will give an exhibition on the A. & M. College grounds tomorrow.
