Another Japanese Victory Reported From Port Arthur

[By Private Wire Black, Staggs & Co.]

New York, February 15.—1 p. m.—Report just received of another Japanese victory at Port Arthur. It is reported that eight Russian vessels were sunk and ten captured, but the latter report is unofficial. The correspondent adds to his report that the Russians were ashore when the attack began.

London, February 15.—The Tokio correspondent wires that firing was heard in the direction of Fuyama off Hakodate on Saturday, but out of sea. He wires also that the Vladivostok war ships are being sighted at intervals in the Japanese sea.

New York, February 15.—Cable advices this morning indicate an attack on Vladivostok by the Japanese, and the result of this will be awaited with interest. It is officially announced that Russia has not made any request upon Great Britain for permission for Russian war vessels to pass the Dardanelles.

Hanna Reported Dead.

Black, Staggs & Co., the local cotton brokers, received a bulletin from Washington this morning, announcing the death of Senator Marcus Hanna, which occurred this morning. His death was followed by a decided decline in the cotton market.

Hanna was regarded as the leader of the Republican party, and his death is a serious loss to that party, as well as to the industrial world.

New York, February 15.—The news ticker says Hanna is undoubtedly dying.

Washing, Feb. 15.—10:50 a. m.—Hanna is dying. His family have been summoned to his bedside.

SUIT IS WON BY CITY OF TYLER

Cotton Belt Headquarters Will Remain in Smith County.

Tyler, Tex., Feb. 13.—The case of the city of Tyler and others against the Cotton Belt Railroad Company, on trial in the district court during the whole of this week, was concluded today. The argument lasted for two days, and was finished last night. Judge Simpson submitted the matter to the jury on special issues of fact, there being twenty odd questions, all of which were answered by the jury favorably to the plaintiffs.

The jury's verdict on the special issues established that in 1880 the Texas and St. Louis railroad made a written contract with Tyler by which it, for certain considerations, agreed to perpetually keep its main machine shops and general offices at Tyler, the road getting grounds for shops, right of way and a cash bonus, that the company put its shops and offices at Tyler. The St. Louis, Arkansas and Texas railroad succeeded that company, and kept the shops at Tyler, but moved its offices to Texarkana.

The city brought suit against the company to enjoin the removal and to bring the offices back to Tyler. The St. Louis, Arkansas and Texas road was succeeded by the present Cotton Belt in Texas.

One of the issues found by the jury was that the Cotton Belt in 1891 ratified and adopted the contract of 1880, by agreeing with the city to carry out that contract if the city would dismiss the suit then pending and give the road twenty acres of additional ground for shop purposes, which was done, and the Cotton Belt brought its general offices back to Tyler from Texarkana.
