TEXANS LOST LIVES IN BLOW

Reports Show Six Deaths and Several People Hurt.—Damage Was Great.

Mexia, Texas, April 8.—In a cyclone which passed just south of Mexia yesterday afternoon, John Bullard, his wife and 4-year-old child were killed outright. They were negroes.

There were thirteen persons injured in all, some of whom will die.

The following property damages resulted: Kezees gin, completely demolished, as were the houses of George Persons, Gracie Livingston, Lem Hobly and Pat Lucy.

Further Life Lost.

Buffalo, Texas, April 8.—Further reports from Freestone county indicate serious damage to life and property from a cyclone yesterday.

A house was demolished near Brewer, killing a woman and two children. Five others were injured.

Ben Biggs' residence was destroyed at Mills, and the family injured to an extent unknown.

The houses of Otis Hill and Manning Brown were destroyed.

The path of the cyclone was thirty yards wide.

Compulsory Education

KATY FLYER IN A WRECK

Spreading of Rails Caused Bad Accident in Kansas—Sixteen Were Hurt.

Fort Scott, Kan., April 8.—The Missouri, Kansas and Texas flyer was wrecked early today four miles south of here while running at full speed.

The wreck was caused by the rails spreading. The engine left the track first, and following it the baggage, mail and express cars were piled up.

The smoker and chair cars were also overturned and badly damaged.

As soon as the first excitement subsided those of the passengers and crew who were uninjured set quickly to work to aid the unfortunates, who were laid beside the track until physicians arrived from Fort Scott.

Two physicians left Fort Scott for the scene on a handcar, and following them closely was a wrecking train borrowed from the Frisco railway. The injured were taken to Fort Scott.

Later—Sixteen persons were injured, none fatally. Among the injured are: Mrs. R. G. Callahan of San Antonio, Texas, E. S. Dawson of Durant, I. T., W. C. Karson of St. Louis, C. T. Mount of Kansas City and J. D. Thompson.

A Wagon Bed Full.

On account of the warmth of the ground which caused it to melt rapidly, there are perhaps a great many people who do not realize the amount of hail which fell during the hail-storm last Thursday afternoon. Back of Holman's hardware store there was a wagon standing under the edge of the awning. With what hail fell in the wagon bed enough rolled off the awning to completely fill it, and the owner was compelled to throw it out with a shovel before his team could move the wagon.—Pittsburg Chronicle.

The new line will take in the communities of Tennessee Colony, Blackfoot, Concord, Bradford and Montalba, with between thirty-five and forty subscribers.


