LOUISIANA GOES DEMOCRATIC

Result of the Election of That State Already Determined.

New Orleans, April 19.—The quadrennial state election is being held in Louisiana today. There are two tickets in the field. Former Justice N. C. Blanchard of the supreme court heads that of the democrats nominated in the January primary.

General W. J. Nohan, an ex-Confederate soldier and prominent sugar planter, is the candidate for the lily white republicans for governor. The old line republicans have no ticket.

A full legislature is being voted for, which will elect United States Senator Murphy J. Foster, nominated at the primary, and he will be chosen as his own successor. There is little interest in the election, as there is no doubt of the result.

The republicans claim only four out of the 69 parishes in the state. The democrats conceded them none. The lily whites put a ticket in the field simply to maintain their position. They are at present in control of all federal offices in the state.

Seattle, Wash., April 19.—A special to the Post-Intelligencer from Dawson City, says:

The Klondike will produce at least \$10,000,000 this season. None has done more work this winter than ever before, and swell the total several millions more.

The first sluicing of the year in the Klondike has begun. The clean-up will be in full blast in three weeks.

An Election Killing.

New Orleans, April 19.—The election is forcibly recalled today by a tragedy at Gonzales, in Ascension parish, where the lily whites and democrats are closely divided. A bitter fight has been in progress there over local offices.

Captain Sam Moore, a former sheriff under the democrats, who was leading the lily white faction, became involved in a dispute at the polls and was instantly killed by Deputy Sheriff Ed Smith.

Moore was attempting to post a picture of negro officeholders under the democratic administration.

Smith interfered with him on the ground that the picture would breed trouble at the polls. Moore resented the interference with him, it is said, and attempted to draw a pistol. Smith was quicker and killed him.

Moore came originally from the vicinity of Gloster, Miss., and was a prominent farmer of Ascension.

CHICAGO BANDIT LIVES TO DIE

Neidermeier Will Be Hanged at Chicago Next Friday.

Chicago, April 19.—County Physician McNamara said today that Neidermeier, the bandit, would live to die on the gallows next Friday.

Neidermeier's throat and stomach are in such a condition he can eat no solid food.

He is one of the car barn bandits, and attempted suicide twice yesterday, first by eating matches, and then by opening the veins of his wrist with a lead pencil. After being carried to the hospital and the wound he tore out the stitches which his nurse was off his guard.

DYNAMITE IN HUNT FOR OIL

Waco Hole Shot in Hopes of Increasing the Flow.

Waco, Texas, April 19.—A charge of 60 pounds of 60 per cent dynamite was touched off yesterday afternoon in the oil well on Columbus street in an effort to create a basin for the collection of oil, and for about 30 seconds it looked as if a genuine old gusher had been encountered, as there was a perfect shower of mud, water and small stones and oil from the well.
