ment bureau for the week says: In most of the districts east of the Mississippi river cotton has not made a rapid growth, and is generally small, although healthy and well cultivated. Good growth, however, is reported from Mississippi and a portion of Alabama, and while lice are increasing in the last named state, they are less numerous in Mississippi and South Carolina. West of the Mississippi the advance of the crop has been more rapid, a good growth being generally reported, and while some fields are

WHOLE ARMY WAS TRAPPED

Tokio, June 28.-It is semi-officially announced here that the Japanese have gained a sweeping victory in Manchuri, practically crushing the Russian army and cutting off the retreat of a considerable portion of it at Hai Cheng, while it is regarded as probable from the latest advices from the front that Kuroki has taken Liao Yang and entrapped pretty nearly the whole of the Russian army.
