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PALESTINE IS AN ORDERLY TOWN

The Corporation Court Is Doing Practically No Business—Income From This Source Is Small.

There were no cases before the corporation court this morning. In commenting on this fact, City Secretary C. A. Sterne says Palestine certainly holds the record as an orderly city. He quoted his records to prove his statement. For the month of June there were only twenty-four cases before the court, and the total in fines and costs for the month was \$212.20. For July the record shows twenty cases and a total in fines and costs of \$160.00. Only three of these cases were for drunks, and two of these were cases during the log rolling exercises, and were not residents of Palestine. This is a good showing for law and order.

In this connection, too, we can add that the county jail is entertaining only a small number of prisoners, and the record of the county is equally as good as that of the city.

Did Business.

All Palestine business houses report good business during the log rolling. One merchant declared there was more trade in that crowd than in four days of last fall's carnival. In looking for a reason one is bound to admit that to be able to trade people must have money. And further theorizing brings us to this conclusion: Nine out of ten of that crowd of visitors came from the north of us. They came from Jacksonville, Arp, Troupe, Tyler, Longview and intervening stations—the very heart of the fruit and truck industry. Those crops have just been marketed, and those sections made rich thereby. Hence the money that our merchants got from them.
