YOUNG LADY BADLY BURNED

A Lamp Exploded and Set Fire to Her Clothing—Her Mother Also Burned.

Last evening at about 7:30 o'clock Miss Jessie Schnorr, a young lady about sixteen years of age, was the victim of a serious and painful accident, the result of a kerosene lamp explosion.

Mr. Jacob Schnorr, who conducts a grocery business at the corner of Third and Lacy street, gave the Herald the following story of the accident:

Miss Schnorr and several smaller children were in the rear of the house, in the dining-room or kitchen, and alone. Some one tapped on a window and frightened them and they all ran for the front of the house, and as Miss Schnorr started she picked up the lamp. It is supposed that she tripped and fell or that she dropped the lamp, and it exploded. Her clothing was ignited.

Her mother and a number of ladies who were seated on the front gallery, went immediately to her rescue, but before they could extinguish the flames the young lady was frightfully burned. Medical attention was at once secured.

Mrs. Schnorr's arms were badly burned in trying to extinguish the fire on the young lady's clothing.

The fire company was called out, but the fire was out before they arrived. Only a small damage was done to the house and furnishings.

It is not known who tapped on the window.
