## WILL ARBITRATE DIFFERENCES

The Davey Oil Well Matter Is to Be Settled Out of the Courts.

Today a committee of arbitration is hearing testimony in the case of Ezell, Bell and others against M. A. Davey, in which action was brought against Mr. Davey on the charge of non-fulfillment of contract in sinking some prospect wells near Neches.

## STORM RAGES ON ATLANTIC

London, Jan. 16.—A fierce gale last night caused much havoc along the coasts of the United Kingdom. There were a number of wrecks of small craft, resulting in loss of life.

A French ketch was driven ashore on the Isle of Wight and her crew of five men were drowned.

No less than 500 steamers are seeking shelter at Holyhead.

law, the other providing for the incorporation of "state banks."

The caption of the "general food law" is entitled an "act to prohibit and prevent adulteration, fraud and deception in the manufacture and sale of articles of food and drink; prescribing penalties for the violation of the act, and providing for the appointment of a dairy and food commissioner."

The different sections of the "bill" are very explicit in defining adulteration of articles of food, its manufacture for sale and in providing penalties for violation of the act, provision being made for the appointment by the governor of a dairy and food commissioner, who shall be a practical analytical chemist, also giving the commissioner authority to appoint a deputy commissioner and six inspectors to enable him to put into effect all the several provisions of the proposed law.
