Some Old Papers.

The Herald received a call this morning from Mr. W. F. Wynne, and he had with him for the inspection of the writer, some old war time papers, among them a copy of the Ouchita Herald, of Camden, Ark., printed in 1861, and an extra of the Eagle, printed the same year at the same place. There were also numerous letters of an early date, some bearing Colored estate stamps, and others endorsed, stating that the postage had been paid. It took 10 cents in those days to carry a letter. There was also a program of an annual Odd Fellows ball, that was quaint in appearance.

The newspapers were bristling with war news, as they were printed during the stirring times of the war between the states.

The papers were the property of Mr. Wynne's mother, who died in this county a few days ago.
