#### CITATION.

THE STATE OF TEXAS,  
To the Sheriff or any Constable of Anderson County, Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to summon Wm. S. McKinney, by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the 3rd Judicial District; but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said 3rd Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Anderson county, to be holden at the court house thereof, in Palestine, on the 4th Monday in November, A. D. 1905, the same being the 27th day of November, A. D. 1905, then and there to answer Plaintiff's second amended original petition filed in said Court, on the 27th day of October, A. D. 1905, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 7256, wherein J. T. Hassell is Plaintiff and W. R. Herron, L. W. Merrifield and Wm. S. McKinney are Defendants, said suit being an action of trespass to try title and said petition alleging that plaintiff is the owner in fee simple of the following described tract or parcel of land, situated in Anderson county, Texas, about 2 3/4 miles east from the city of Palestine, the same being part of the S. G. Wells league and described as follows:

Beginning at the s e corner of a tract conveyed to W. M. Gibson by heirs of Geo. K. Gibson, deceased, a stake in the Palestine and Rosey bridge road, from which a hickory 12 in in dia brs s 30 1 2 degrees w 3 2-10 varas distant, marked x, a post oak 14 in. in dia marked s g brs s 42 1-2 degrees w 12 varas distant; thence n 1 4 degrees e 1380 varas to J. J. Redwine's s w corner, a stake from which a hickory 20 in. in dia brs n 7 1 2 degrees w 1 vara, and a red oak 18 in. in dia brs s 18 degrees 3 varas; thence n 83 1-2 degrees e 237 6-10 varas to a stake for corner; thence s 1 4 degrees w 957 3-10 varas to a stake in the line of wire fence for corner, from which a red oak 5 in. in dia brs s 7 1-4 degrees e 6-10 varas; thence n 71 degrees e with wire fence 80 varas; thence s 1-4 degrees w 440 varas to the s line of said tract aforesaid; thence with said s boundary line 88 1-2 degrees w 314 2-10 varas to the place of beginning, containing 63 83-100 acres.

That on January 1st, 1905, defendants unlawfully entered upon said lands, and dispossessed plaintiff of same to his great damage. Plaintiff alleges title in him to said land by virtue of a conveyance of the title thereto to him by W. B. and Mary E. McKinney, of all their right, title, claim and interest in said land; that defendant, Wm. S. McKinney is claiming some interest in said land under a deed of trust executed and delivered by defendant, W. R. Herron to J. F. Weeks, trustee, of record in the County Clerk's office of Anderson, Vol. 13, page 167. Plaintiff prays for title and possession of said land against all of the said defendants, and that the cloud on plaintiff's title by reason of the above deed of trust, be removed, and for damages, costs, general and special relief.

Herein fail not, but have before said Court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.
