COMMISSIONERS**

Proceedings of the Regular Fall Term of Court, Which Now in Session.

Commissioners court met in regular session for the November term Monday, Nov. 13, 1905. Present and presiding, His Honor, R. E. Erwin, county judge; commissioners present: John F. Nash, precinct No. 1; W. H. Parrish, commissioner precinct No. 2; W. N. Herrington, commission No. 3; and W. M. Brown, commissioner No. 4; Deputy County Clerk W. L. Rogers and H. A. Watts, sheriff.

The following orders were passed: 1st. Came on to be heard the several applications for superintendent of county farm, which said applications having been seen and heard, it is ordered by the court that W. J. Pierce be and is hereby appointed superintendent of the county poor farm for the ensuing year, and further ordered that County Judge R. E. Erwin is authorized to enter into a contract with said W. J. Pierce upon the same terms as have heretofore been made.

2nd. Came on to be considered the application for superintendent for the residence on public roads. Upon a vote, E. F. Elrod was duly appointed for the ensuing year, beginning January 1st, 1906, ending December 31, 1906.

3rd. On motion it is ordered by the court that Dr. E. B. Parsons be and is hereby appointed physician of the county jail and county camp, and further ordered that Dr. H. R. Link be and is hereby appointed physician for the county farm, and both to be al-

vey; thence n w with the east line to west corner of the J. B. Trainery survey; thence with the n w line of said survey to a corner of same; thence with the n e line to the east corner of said survey; thence with the s line of the J. B. Trainery survey to where it joins onto the sub-division that was voted on in Sept. 29, 1905, and known as the D. M. Anderson stock law sub-division; thence with the meanders of said sub-division to the place of beginning on Squirrel creek.

And we ask your honorable body to appoint O. E. Kilgo as manager of said election, and to be held at Johnnie Sutherland's residence.

Mora league; thence n w with the line of said survey to the w corner of same and being the s corner of the J. Gibson survey; thence s w with said Gibson survey to where Squirrel creek crosses said league line; thence down said creek to where G. T. Bradford's w line corners on Squirrel creek; thence with the west line to Alder Branch creek; thence with Alder Branch creek to where it crosses the n line of said Gibson survey to the Palestine and Warden's crossing, public road; thence with said public road to the east line of the J.
