THAT IS DECISION OF ATTORNEY GENERAL WITH REFERENCE TO CITY ELECTION.

The following correspondence with regard to the opening and closing of the polls in the city election next Tuesday is self-explanatory:

From Attorney General. Austin, Texas, March 28, 1906. R. M. Johnson, City Attorney, Palestine, Texas.

Dear Sir:—Replying to yours of the 26th you are advised that Section 64 of the Terrell Election Law controls Article 390 of the Revised Statutes, and city elections, as well as other elections which come within the terms of the Terrell Election Law, must be governed by the provisions of this section.

From City Attorney Johnson. Palestine, Texas, March 29, 1906.

The above letter is in reply to one I wrote the Attorney General for information as to the time the polls should be closed in the coming city election. Section 64 says: "In all elections, general, special or primary, the polls shall be open from eight o'clock in the morning until seven o'clock in the evening, and the election shall be held for one day only."

Article 390 of the Revised Statutes provides that in all elections held under that title (18) the polls shall be open from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. The contention that this article is not controlled by section 64 of the Terrell

BLANKET PRIMARY

Will Likely Be Voted by the House at Austin Today.

Austin, Texas, March 28.—The first test vote on the bill came this evening just after Mr. Harris had concluded his speech. It was on the adoption of the resolution to declare the candidate, state or district, who got a majority of all the votes cast the nominee of the party. It carried by a majority of nine, and was considered a strictly test vote.

Tonight a caucus was held by the friends of the blanket primary and some ten or twelve additions to the ranks are claimed, this number coming into the caucus and declaring that their vote against the amendment today was the fulfillment of their promise, and that they were now absolved.

The friends of the blanket primary offered and passed the amendment to see if the bill could be changed, and they were highly pleased at the result, as Mr. Harris of Galveston, one of the leaders against the primary, admitted that under the governor's call the amendment was constitutional.

Fetichism—New Style.

The case of a German student who is reported to have been arrested for stealing plates of human hair is an example of what has been called fetichism, a not inapt use of an old term for an old tendency. A certain deceased English nobleman of the present generation who used to pocket the silver spoons of others when he went into society was never believed to do so in order to enrich himself. He was wealthy. A few years ago in a Manchester court an elderly man of many convictions was before the judge. He was not a mercenary thief. He had always stolen one particular thing, to the exclusion of all others—spoons. Similarly, one remembers a woman thief, with a long record of previous convictions, whose theft was always of one kind, and that not of a remunerative description. Her fetich was newly washed clothes hanging upon a line to dry, and she never tried to possess herself of anything else. Fetichism is not confined to criminal psychology. There seems a strain of it in the normal mind. A distinguished university graduate and traveler told me that he found fetichism so universal that much of his recreation in going through the world lay in a constant attempt to discover the fetich of each person he met.—Manchester Guardian.
