CONDITINS MUCH BETTER

The Fires Are About Under Control, and Relief Trains Are Arriving With Food and Water.

Washington, D. C., April 21, 10:30 a. m.—Funston wires this morning: "The fire is making no progress through from Van Ness street west. The wind in considerable force is beginning to blow. Indications now are that portion of the city from Van Ness avenue north to bay will be destroyed."

"Apprehension is now felt for Fort Mason. The weather is fine, and warm, and there is practically no suffering from cold. It is impossible to establish proper sanitary conditions, and I expect much sickness. If that portion of the city to the west now standing is saved a number of buildings can be used there for hospitals. The water supply is encouraging, and I expect ten to twelve million gallons daily."

An earlier dispatch, received at 2:20 this morning, says: "Friday a hard and probably successful fight was made to save the western part of the city. Supplies are arriving. Admiral Goodrich landed all available men under his command and placed them under my orders." Funston.

DYNAMITE WAS EFFECTIVE.

Fire That Was Sweeping Water Front Stopped by That Means.

Oakland, Cal., April 21.—Fanned by a brisk northwest wind the fire swept over Telegraph Hill toward Fort Mason licked up a strip of buildings along the water front, and headed in a semi-circle towards the Union Ferry House. At day break the Henry Machine Works were dynamited, and streams of water from tugs and vessels in the bay apparently checked the flames at Lombard street wharf. Through the ferry house is the only means of exit from San Francisco, and it seemed to be saved. Patients in emergency hospitals in that neighborhood were brought over here. The wind has started new fires in sections already burned.

BOATS PRESSED INTO SERVICE

Transferring San Franciscans Across the Bay to Oakland.

Oakland, Cal., April 21.—All boats available are pressed into service this morning, transferring San Franciscans to this side of the bay.

Food is distributed to each boat load as it arrives. Only the prompt arrival of relief supplies here today prevented famine on this side of the bay.

Oakland papers this morning sent out thousands of lists of names of San Franciscans, giving their temporary abodes, also lists of injured persons furnished for free distribution throughout the city and through the refugee camps.

At Mayor Schmidt's temporary office, Fillmore and Bush streets, and in all camps registers are opened. These will be the means of reuniting hundreds of families, and are relieving much mental worry.

A VERY FAST TRAIN

Is Carrying Relief to the Sufferers on the Pacific Coast.

Chicago, April 21.—The first government relief train made 166 miles in 161 minutes this morning. It left

Rock Island at 5:30, and expects to reach Oakland Monday. The second train passed Crestline, Ohio, at 3 a. m., and the third train passed at 4:30 and four and five will go on today. Each consists of nine cars, and travels at a tremendous speed. Every shipment is accompanied by men capable of distributing it properly.

FOUR HUNDRED TONS OF FOOD

Left Stockton Last Night for the Starving in San Francisco.

Oakland, Cal., April 21.—A boat loaded with four hundred tons of food left Stockton last night for San Francisco. More is to be sent via the Santa Fe today. Hundreds of students of the Stanford University will work under direction of Associated Charities as carriers of supplies, or in any other capacity required. Hundreds of people penned between fires on Hyde, Russian and Telegraph hills, were taken off by yessels.

General Funston and Mayor Schmidt established new quarters at Fort Mason. The relief work under their direction is harmonious and systematic. Hundreds of thousands of gallons of milk are being distributed to women and children, and to invalids.

Some smallpox cases are reported among the morning in colonies of refugees in Chinatown. Many virulent cases of their beds at the time of the earthquake, and are abroad, spreading infection. This may mean a calamity to this heroic city, which is a haven for fifty thousand earthquake victims.

A SECOND MILLION

Will be Appropriated by the Government, on Request of Taft.

Washington, D. C., April 21.—Taft has asked President Roosevelt to request a second million dollars appropriation from congress. The president will do so. It is deemed necessary to prevent great suffering.

CITY WILL REBUILD.

Workmen Already Being Engaged to Begin Work of Rebuilding.

Oakland, Cal., April 21.—Communication with San Francisco has been re-established, perhaps permanently. Officials believe all fires are now under control.

The thoughts of the people are concentrated on rebuilding the burned and wrecked city, and workmen are being engaged in great numbers to carry away the debris preparatory to reconstruction of the down-town district. Trains with building stones are to be given preference over everything but relief trains. The San Francisco post office has been transferred to Oakland, and the delivery of mails has begun.


