NERVE OF OFFICERS PREVENTED LYNCHING

AN ATTEMPT TO STORM THE
JAIL LAST NIGHT WAS FRUS-
TRATED BY SHERIFF'S FORCE.

A mob of about 150 or 200 men, masked, went to the county jail last night, and made a demand for the negro arrested by a deputy who is supposed to have some connection or knowledge of the attempt at criminal assault in this city a few weeks ago. The mob assembled near the jail, and spent some time parleying, and before their approach Deputies Hardman and Ritchie, who were spending the night there, had been notified, and they prepared for the approaching demand for the negro. In the meantime Sheriff Henry Watts had been phoned for.

The mob approached the jail, and some of them entered the front door, leading to the iron wicker gate, and to the sheriff's office. A light in this office was turned out. Deputy Ritchie and Hardman, well armed, stationed themselves at the head of the stairs, and a demand was made on the mob to retire. In turn the mob demanded the keys to the wicker gate, and threatened to break it down if the demand was not complied with. They were coolly informed that the prisoner would be protected at all cost, and that if they insisted, and did break down the wicker, they would be fired upon. And just at this instance Sheriff Watts showed up unexpectedly in an unexpected place. Just across the street from the front entrance of the jail he stood, and demanded with great emphasis that the mob depart, and that instant, or take the consequence. It is stated that something of a panic ensued in the ranks of the would-be lynchers. They left, and the retreat was a hurried one.

Mr. Ben Greenwood had been telephoned for also, and he came to the jail and tried to argue the mob out of its determination. They would not hear him.

Sheriff Watts was seen by a Herald man this morning, and he was asked what would probably have been his course had the mob not heeded his command to depart. The answer was anticipated before it was spoken. He replied:

"I would have kept the obligation of my oath, though I lost my life by it. I would have protected my prisoner if it had been necessary to have killed men as long as life lasted or my ammunition held out." And any one knowing Henry Watts knows he spoke the truth.

The very determination of the man, and his reputation as an officer who will perform his duty prevented this mob doing its work.

The sheriff says there is a very reasonable doubt of this man's guilt, and that the identification is by no means complete, and that the prisoner can prove an alibi by one of the best citizens of the county at whose home he was at the hour the attempted crime was committed. This, he says, will be brought out in the investigation.

Mr. Watts says he fears no further trouble, but that if it comes he will be fully prepared to meet it.

CHINATOWN LOOTED AT SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, April 26.—The banks are preparing to resume business in a preliminary way before the opening of the vaults. The depositors can get five hundred dollars on accounts on checks endorsed by cashiers of banks when presented to the mint.

Twenty-four planing mills in the city escaped destruction. Some of them are running night and day, and others are to be in shape soon.

The withdrawal of the troops from Chinatown was followed by a rush of looters. Hundreds are digging in the ruins. Valuable bronze trinkets have been recovered; also chunks of metal supposed to be melted coin.

Taking advantage of the destruction of San Francisco, the real estate syndicate of Oakland is making strenuous efforts to build up Oakland. Plans have been drawn for the reclamation of five hundred acres of tide land.

BRIG. GEN. SERRALL
