GALVESTON SHUT OFF ONLY BRIDGE BURNS

THE SINGLE BRIDGE CONNECTING GALVESTON WAS PARTIALLY BURNED THIS MORNING.

Galveston, Texas, June 12.—The railroad bridge across Galveston bay, connecting the Island City with the main land at Virginia Point, was partially burned this morning. Some three hundred feet of the bridge was destroyed. This shuts Galveston off from railroad transportation until the bridge can be repaired. It is expected the work will be done within the next twenty-four hours. The railroads will be greatly inconvenienced so far as handling perishable freight or live stock is concerned.

REPORT FROM HOUSTON

Says It Will Be Three Days Before the Bridge Is Repaired and Open.

Houston, Texas, June 12.—Three hundred feet of the Santa Fe bridge across the Galveston bay, the only outlet by rail since the great storm and flood, was burned this morning. The city is cut off by rail with the outside world, and it will be fully three days before communication is restored.

Before the storm there were three railroad bridges across the bay, but only the Santa Fe rebuilt since, and all of the roads entering Galveston have sent the trains over this bridge.

WITHDREW FROM FRISCO.

German Insurance Company Doesn't Like the New Insurance Law.

IOWAIAN BUYS WOOD BROS.' FRUIT FARM

FOR THE SUM OF TWENTY-FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS, AND NEW OWNER WILL LOCATE HERE.

Mr. C. H. Winder from Independence, Ia., has purchased the Wood Bros. farm of 240 acres three miles west of the city, for the sum of \$24,000. This is one of the best farms and orchards in this section, there being about two hundred acres in young bearing orchard. Mr. Winder says he will locate on the place, and that he will induce other families from his section to locate here. He says there is undoubtedly a great future for this section.

He will find a welcome to this section, as will all other good people.

Mr. H. D. Wood, who was in charge of the farm, says he has not yet fully made up his mind just what he will do. It is to be hoped he will remain a citizen of this town or county.

TEXAS WAIF IN NEW YORK

PACKERIES GUILTY OF TAKING REBATES

ON FREIGHT SHIPMENTS FROM KANSAS CITY TO THE ATLANTIC SEABOARD.—BIG CONCERNS.

Kansas City, Mo., June 12.—The Morris, Cudahy, Armour and Swift Packing Companies were found guilty of accepting rebates on freight from this city to the Atlantic Seaboard, in the Federal court today. The packers pleaded that the freight was shipped under existing contracts. Judge McPherson in instructing the jury said: "The defendant companies had no right to make contracts that would extend beyond the time of filing of the new schedules with the Interstate Commerce Commission which fixes rates at a different and a higher figure to the general public."

MOTHER UNDER SUSPICION

For the Murder of Daughter.—Advanced Age is a Shield to Her.

New York, June 12.—The police admit today that they have Mrs. Staton, the mother of Alice Kinna, murdered in her doorway at her home, under surveillance. The woman's advanced age, something more than eighty, stands between her and actual arrest. The police believe the mother alone knows all of the details of the murder. It has developed in a searching investigation that the woman had quarreled over a fee to be paid in a suit for real estate.

SECRETARY SHAW

Cancels His Date to Orate at the Syracuse University.

WOMEN STILL PROTEST

Against the Hanging of Mrs. Aggie Myers in Missouri.

CHICKEN THIEF

Was Wounded and Fearing Disgrace Shot Himself Through Brains.

Iola, Kas., June 12.—Andy Hawkins, a laborer, was shot early this morning by Frank Parks, a farmer, while stealing the latter's chickens. Fearing disgrace, Hawkins pulled his own pistol and shot himself through the brains. Parks was not arrested.

Campbell Club at Karnes City.
Karnes City, Texas, June 11.—A Tom Campbell Club of a great many names has been formed in this city, and it is still swelling. This county, his friends claim, will give him in the primary election probably four-fifths of the votes, as he is very popular among the people.

SCORES HURT IN A NEW YORK FIRE

THE STUYVESANT-WHELOCK PIANO COMPANY'S PLANT DAMAGED THIS MORNING.
