## TOM JOHNSON SAYS BRYAN IS THE MAN

HIS FEDERAL OWNERSHIP IDEAS  
WILL FORCE REPUBLICANS TO  
NOMINATE ROOSEVELT.

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 4.—Tom  
Johnson, mayor, believes Bryan's Fed-  
eral ownership of railroads ideas will  
force the Republicans to bestow the  
presidential nomination on Roosevelt.  
Johnson says for every Democrat who  
leaves the party on account of the  
ownership plank ten recruits will  
come from other parties. He predicts  
Bryan will beat Roosevelt.

BRYAN AT CHICAGO.

He is Given a Great Reception at the  
Windy City on the Lakes.

Chicago, Sept. 4.—Bryan arrived  
here this morning from Detroit, ac-  
companied by the Nebraska reception  
party. He was met by the Jefferson  
Club and the Iroquois Club. Commit-  
tees from these clubs escorted him to  
the hotel in an automobile. Until  
noon the Nebraskans rested with his  
family. The Iroquois luncheon fol-  
lows, with a banquet by the Jefferson  
Club tonight.

Bryan will allow himself a rest of  
only five days at Lincoln before start-  
ing his campaigning. He goes to St.  
Louis, Cincinnati and Louisville, and  
expects to set himself right with the  
solid South on the railroad ownership  
question. The Nebraska delegation  
learned today that seats would be  
provided for them at tonight's banquet  
in a room adjoining that in which  
Bryan will be seated. A committee  
was sent to the Jefferson Club to say  
that the Nebraskans must be seated  
in the main room or they won't attend.

tive party which is to visit the United  
States to study educational methods  
here.

## COLLEGE PRESIDENTS WANT IT.

Announced Over Eight Hundred Have  
Indorsed Reformed Spelling.

New York, Sept. 6.—The simplified  
spelling board announces that eight  
hundred and twenty-five college pres-  
idents, professors and university of-  
ficials have identified themselves  
with the movement that has been  
given impetus by Roosevelt. New  
York, Illinois, Massachusetts and Cal-  
ifornia furnish a number of pedagogic  
recruits, and Kansas contributes  
twenty.

## PICKERS ARE SCARCE.

Travis County Cotton Farmers Facing  
Serious Labor Shortage.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 5.—Travis  
county farmers are having trouble in  
getting hands to pick the cotton crop.  
Hundreds of fields are white with the  
fleshy staple, and not a picker is to  
be seen. The problem is a serious  
one. Many farmers are offering 75  
cents a hundred, and still have no  
pickers.

## A BANK CASHIER GAGGED AND ROBBED

TWO BANDITS FOUND HIM IN  
BANK ALONE, AND ROBBED  
THE INSTITUTION.

Ravens, Oregon, Sept. 4.—P. H.  
Vannuchter, cashier of the State Bank  
of Ravens, was overpowered, bound  
and gagged in the rear room of the  
bank yesterday by two bandits, who  
secured \$2500 in gold, and left all sil-  
ver and notes untouched. The cash-  
ier was working on the books alone  
when attacked, and he lay helpless  
for several hours before he was dis-  
covered.

## CRIMINALITY CHARGED.

As Result Arrests Will Follow Failure  
of Real Estate Trust Company.

Philadelphia, Sept. 4.—District At-  
torney Bell, after looking into the af-  
fairs of the defunct Real Estate and  
Trust Company, today said: "There  
is evidence of criminality in connec-  
tion with the collapse, and arrests  
will be made. I can lay my hands on  
the looters now, but am waiting to  
make the cases as nearly perfect as  
possible first. I have not examined  
Treasurer North, Auditor Hill and the  
bank examiner who examined the in-  
stitution, for reasons which may ap-  
pear later.

## DESERTER GIVES UP.

Young Man Requests That He Be Re-  
turned to His Regiment.

Waxahachie, Texas, Sept. 5.—New-  
ton Otis Bard, a deserter from the  
United States army, is being held in  
jail here until he can be returned to  
the military post at Fort Oglethorpe,  
Ga. He claims to have deserted from  
that post last June. He went to Chi-  
cago and spent the summer, leaving  
there about two weeks ago. He ar-  
rived in Waxahachie Monday morning  
and gave himself up to officers that  
night.

## WARNING IS GIVEN.

Commissioner Clay Gives His Opinion  
About Certain Companies.

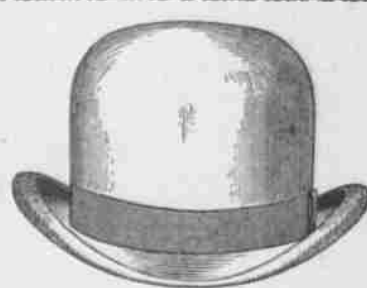
Austin, Texas, Sept. 5.—The state  
insurance department has been ad-  
vised that circular letters are being  
circulated throughout the state by  
Burrows, Marsh & McLennan, insur-  
ance brokers of Chicago, in which  
they are soliciting the people to take  
out fire insurance through them in  
the following companies: Strain  
Phoenix of Vienna, Berlin Fire of Ber-  
lin, Dacia Romania Insurance Com-  
pany, Fonciera Pesth Fire of Buda  
Pesth, Northern Insurance Company  
of Moscow, Providential General of  
Vienna, Salacian Fire of Breslau,  
Warsaw Fire of Warsaw.

Commissioner W. J. Clay said to-  
day: "None of the above companies  
have done business in the United  
States except in a wildcat way, with  
the exception of the Austrian Phoenix  
which had about \$4,000,000 involved  
in the San Francisco disaster. It im-  
mediately withdrew from the United  
States after the great fire and denied  
all of its liabilities. An effort is now  
being made through the state depart-  
ment at Washington to collect the  
claims against this concern."

The proposed insurance would be  
of no value to the insuring public of  
Texas, according to statements made  
by Insurance Commissioner Clay, and  
he takes this method of warning the  
people against these concerns.

## Bryan's Itinerary.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 6.—Bryan, after  
the November elections, will go to  
Panama and South America. It has  
been announced definitely today that  
the proposed Australian trip has been  
abandoned. Bryan visited the state

cock of Omaha.

Mrs. Callens was acting as a judge in  
a colt show.

## MEXICAN REVOLUTIONISTS.

They Had Planned An Attack on  
Nogales, Sonora, Mexico.

Tucson, Ariz., Sept. 4.—Collins Har-  
bert, a Frenchman, Leonard Villieriel  
and Bruno Trevino, Mexicans, were  
arrested today at a nearby mining  
camp by Immigration Inspector Mur-  
phy and two rangers, charged with  
attempting to organize Mexican min-  
ers to attack Nogales, Sonora. The  
plan was to capture the custom house  
and the rurales arsenal. Letters on  
the prisoners show the plans were di-  
rected by Mexican revolutionists in  
St. Louis.
