Rates for Gas to be supplied by the  
Palestine Light, Heat and Power Co.  
to the inhabitants of Palestine:

#### Light.

First 5000 cubic feet or less per  
month, \$1.75 per thousand cubic feet,  
if paid on or before the 15th day of  
the month following that in which gas  
is used.

\$2.00 per thousand if paid after the  
15th.  
All Gas used in excess of 5000  
cubic feet, \$1.50 per thousand, if paid  
on or before the fifteenth of the  
month following that in which Gas  
was used, and \$1.75 per thousand cu-  
bic feet if paid after the 15th.

#### Fuel.

All Gas used for fuel only, \$1.50 per  
thousand cubic feet, if paid on or be-  
fore the 15th of the month following  
that in which gas was used.

#### Fuel and Light.

Wherever Gas is used in the same  
place for both fuel and light one  
meter may be set for both fuel and  
light. (This is to be at the discretion  
of the manager, in cases where he be-  
lieves fuel Gas will be used to justify  
granting of full rate.
