**A BOLD THIEF
SNATCHES SATCHEL**

LADY'S SATCHEL CONTAINING \$5 IN MONEY AND \$300 WORTH OF DIAMONDS TAKEN.

Early last evening, about 8 o'clock, a hand satchel was grabbed from the hands of Mrs. G. H. Turner as she and Mrs. Hufsmith were walking along Magnolia street, opposite the Y. M. C. A. building, and within a stone's throw of the homes of these ladies.
The satchel contained some jewelry belonging to Mrs. Turner, among it some diamonds valued at from \$300 to \$400. The thief made his escape, running down Hoxie street and north from the Y. M. C. A. building. As soon as the ladies realized what had happened they gave chase, and ran the thief nearly a block. He is described as low of stature, and either a dark complexioned white man or a light mulatto negro.
Officers were soon notified, but no trace of the thief or the missing articles could be found.
The ladies had planned a trip to San Antonio and were to have gone on the evening train. They had been to the depot, and the train being late had started to walk back to the Hufsmith home. They were evidently followed from the depot by the thief, who snatched the purse from behind at the point designated.
