CHANGE OF TIME CARD.

A New Schedule Goes Into Effect on the I. & G. N. Tomorrow.

A new schedule takes effect on the I. & G. N. at midnight tonight, and tomorrow all trains will be running on the changed schedule. The changes are not very great, so far as Palestine is concerned, and are as follows:

No. 2 from the south will arrive at 1:10 p. m., instead of 1:05 p. m. as now. It will leave for the north at 1:30 p. m., instead of 1:25 p. m.
No. 3 will arrive from the north at 9:10 a. m., instead of 8:10 a. m., the hour it is supposed to arrive now, and will leave at 9:30 a. m.
No. 5 will arrive from the north at 7:05 p. m., instead of 6:20 p. m. as now, and will leave at 7:55 p. m., instead of 8:05 p. m. as now.
No. 6 will arrive at 7:25 a. m., the same as now, and will leave at 8:15 a. m.

WENT DOWN THE LIST.

Bailey Criticized Everybody Who Has Taken Stand Against Him.

Temple, Texas, Dec. 14.—Senator Bailey and a "blue norther" reached here almost simultaneously this evening. No fuel was burned in the opera house where about 600 men and ladies assembled tonight, but Senator Bailey furnished plenty of warmth to interest them.

His speech in the main was along the same lines as his Belton address. He severely arraigned Attorney General Davidson for the course he has pursued, declaring that he had been a party to a conspiracy to defeat a Democratic nominee. He also discussed the "witnesses against him" more than at Belton.

He also criticized Alvin Ousley of Denton, a member of the anti-Bailey committee, telling of his history in Denton county.

M. M. Crane, he said, represented all the trusts in Texas and had made a compromise of the suit against the Cassidy Southwestern Commission company, paying a penalty of \$7500 for its being a trust. Senator Bailey criticized the course of the attorney general in this matter. He said that \$1500 of the penalty was placed under the law of 1903 and \$6000 under the law of 1899. The commissions to the district attorney under the latter act were larger than the former. As the matter was arranged the commissions were \$1625. If all the penalties had been placed under the law of 1899 they would have been \$425.

APPLICATION FOR CLEMENCY

Will Be Made in Behalf of Patrick by His Wife and Sister.

New York, Dec. 14.—With the withdrawal of the application for a writ of error in the United States supreme court yesterday the legal fight to save Albert T. Patrick came to an end after the hardest fought battle in the criminal records of the country.

It now remains to apply to Governor Higgins for a commutation of sentence to life imprisonment.

In spite of the determination of Patrick himself to accept nothing save a pardon, announced only a few days ago by himself from his cell in Sing Sing prison, such an application, designed merely to save his life, will be made within a few days.

Mrs. Patrick and Patrick's sister, Mrs. Milliken of St. Louis, will be the petitioners, as the nearest relatives of the condemned man. Governor Higgins has not publicly indicated that he would even save Patrick from the electric chair, but such is the expectation of Patrick's wife and of his attorneys.

Patrick was sentenced to die in the electric chair several years ago, following conviction on the charge of murdering William Marsh Rice, a Texas capitalist. Rice, it was charged, was chloroformed to death for the purpose, it is alleged, of allowing Patrick to gain control of his wealth.

Appropriation Bill Passed.

Washington, Dec. 14.—By a vote of 106 to 188 the house today refused to increase from \$5000 to \$7500 the salaries of senators and delegates. The house, however, by an overwhelming vote, increased the salaries of the vice president, the speaker of the house and members of the president's cabinet to \$12,000 each. The several amendments for the increase were offered by Mr. Littauer of New York to the legislative appropriation bill. After discussing the salary question, the house passed the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill and adjourned at 3:45 p. m.

CARS BURNED AT MART.

They Contained a Lot of Flour, Feed and Cotton.

Mart, Texas, Dec. 14.—A fire was discovered at noon today in the south yards of the I. & G. N., in which a car of cotton, a car of 450 sacks of flour, a car of 500 sacks of mill feed, a car of 261 bales of hay, a car of coal and ten bales of cotton on another car, together with five cars, were destroyed, approximating a total loss of \$25,000.

that he scratched Bailey's name in the primaries and voted for N. W. Finley. Cockrell, he further said, resigned as city commissioner to become the attorney for the gas company and to seek a franchise for it before the board of which he had just been a member. He said he understood that Cockrell was the attorney of the gas trust to keep the people of Dallas warm, and of the ice trust to freeze them, and that he owned a graveyard to bury them in. He discussed the News along the same lines as at Belton, calling it a "Hesalan."

In denying that he had written editorials for the Fort Worth Record, he said that if he had been doing so the News would have been skinned proper. The editor of the Record, he thought, was entirely too mild. Having at one time been an employee of the News, Mr. Bailey thought the editor of the Record felt inclined to say the News was honest, although he knew it was not.

Senator Bailey further said that he thought one reason the News had it in for him was because he helped to establish a Democratic paper in North Texas. Of that fact he declared he was proud.

Senator Bailey was introduced by Col. P. L. Downs in a complimentary speech.

Senator Bailey will leave for San Antonio tonight and will go into Comanche county next week.
