ESTIMATES OF DEAD VARY

There Seems to Be No Longer Doubt But That the City Will Go Into the Sea.

Washington, Jan. 18.—A wireless message from Admiral Evans to the cruiser Columbia at Havana was transmitted to Washington today, stating that the Missouri and Indian anchored off Kingston this morning. It further states that Kingston is almost totally destroyed, and at least four hundred people have been killed. Five hundred of the wounded are in the hospitals. There are doctors enough, but a shortage on dressings and bandages. All sorts of substitutes are being used in the great emergency. The city is quiet.

SEEKING FOOD FOR STARVING.

All Available Will Be Gathered Together and Equally Distributed.

Kingston, via Holland Bay, Jan. 18.—Today soldiers started scouring the city for food stuffs. All food found will be gathered together and distributed equally among the earthquake victims.

Governor Swettenham, after a complete tour of the ruins, today gave out a rough estimate of the list of the dead. He thinks it is less than one thousand, and that the property loss will not exceed \$20,000,000.

The wrecked buildings from which the dead have been taken are being

dynamited today, and the work of tearing down the tottering walls continues. Every available white man is searching the ruins for the dead.

Whole Coast Line Changed. Special to the Herald.

Havana, Jan. 18.—Admiral Evans, who landed at Kingston this morning, in a message to the cruiser Columbia here, states that a great tidal wave which followed the earthquake at that place changed the coast line of Jamaica, leaving the entire south side of Kingston under water. No bay is left, and the whole coast line is sinking into the sea.

More Earthquake Shocks. Special to the Herald.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 18.—Two severe earthquake shocks were felt this morning at Kuba, in the Baku government. No great damage reported, though the people are greatly excited.

Soldiers Fired on Looters. Special to the Herald.

Kingston, via Holland Bay, Jan. 18.—Hungry looters invaded the streets of Kingston last night, and they were fired upon by the provost guard. It is believed no one was injured, as the soldiers did not shoot to kill. The looters were hungry, and were seeking food and not the valuables buried in destroyed houses.

BAILEY'S NAME STANDS ALONE

In the Secret Code Book of the Standard Oil Company.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 17.—Joseph W. Bailey was "The Man from Texas" in the code book of the Waters Pierce Oil company. A close scrutiny of the private record on the subsidiary company of the Standard Oil trust has failed to disclose the name of any other prominent man from this section of the country. In company with John D. Rockefeller, H. Clay Pierce, C. M. Wams, J. P. Gruet and other officers and creatures of the trust, the name of the senator from Texas appears.

Before it is the code name—"Republican."

The name of Senator Culberson could not be found and did not appear in the record. That of James Stephen Hogg was missing from the list of those commencing with the letter H.

Attorney General Davidson had no place in the booklet.

The name of practically every town and city in Texas has its synonym in the secret record of the code. The Driskill hotel in Austin is to be found. Gainesville, the home of Senator Bailey, is also there.

MAYFIELD IS CHAIRMAN.

He Succeeds Storey as Head of the Commission.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 17.—Hon. Allison Mayfield was today elected chairman of the Texas railroad commission. The law requires the commission to elect officers every two years, and at a meeting held today that business was taken up.

Mr. Colquitt made a motion to elect Mr. Mayfield chairman, and the motion was carried by the votes of Mr. Colquitt and Judge Storey. Mr. Mayfield cast his vote for Judge Storey, who has been chairman of the commission since Judge Reagan, the first chairman, retired four years ago. Mr. Mayfield has been a member of the commission for nine years.

All employees of the commission were upon motion of Mr. Colquitt continued in office.

Oregon Law Adopted.

Guthrie, Ok., Jan. 18.—The constitutional convention adopted sections of the initiative and referendum law as are effective in Oregon. The liquor interests are claiming a victory as certain for high license and local option.

HORRIBLE CONDITIONS REPORTED IN CHINA

STARVING PEOPLE ARE EATING CHILDREN IN TWO FAMINE STRICKEN DISTRICTS.

Special to the Herald. Victoria, B. C., Jan. 18.—Advices received here tell of the increasing horrors from the great famine of Central China. In two districts, Sinchow and Pachow, the starving people are eating the children. All plants and grass which furnish food for many, have entirely disappeared, not even the roots being left.

A Shanghai correspondent says cases of cannibalism are many, and that he personally saw many instances of it. He says he saw human flesh being sold in the market places.

Assassin Was Executed.
